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1 Background

1.1 Approved Project

New England Solar Project (NES) was granted Development Consent from the Department of Planning, Infrastructure and Environment (DPIE) (now the Department of Planning and Environment [DPE]) on 9 March 2020 (SSD 9255). The Development Consent was most recently modified on 26 May 2023 (Modification 2), after receiving approval for Modification 1 on 9 Feb 2021.

1.1.1 General project description

ACEN Australia Pty Ltd (ACEN Australia) (formerly named UPC Renewables Australia Pty Ltd) has approval to develop the New England Solar and Battery Project; a significant grid-connected solar and battery energy storage system (BESS) project along with associated infrastructure (the Project), approximately 6 kilometres (km) east of the township of Uralla, which lies approximately 19 km south of Armidale, in the Uralla Shire local government area (LGA) (hereafter referred to as NES). NES is within the New England Renewable Energy Zone (REZ). NES was approved, subject to conditions, by the New South Wales (NSW) Independent Planning Commission (IPC) on 9 March 2020 (SSD 9255).

NES will be constructed in the following stages:

- Stage 1a: Construction of a 400 megawatt (MW) solar farm within the Northern Array, which commenced on 7 February 2022 and is expected to be completed by Q4 2023
- Stage 1b: Operations of 400MW solar
- Stage 2a: Construction of a 320 megawatt (MW) solar farm within the Central Array, which is expected to commence by Q1 2024
- Stage 2b: Operations of 320MW solar
- Stage 3a: Construction of 200MW/2hr BESS within the approved Substation/BESS area, which is expected to commence by Q1 2024
- Stage 3b: Operations of 200MW/2hr BESS
- Stage 4a: Construction of 1200MW/2hr BESS within the approved Substation/BESS area
- Stage 4b: Operations of 1200MW/2hr BESS
- Stage 5: Decommissioning

1.2 Working Hours

1.2.1 Construction

Unless approval has been obtained from the Secretary, construction, upgrading and decommissioning activities on site can only be undertaken between the following hours:

- 7 am to 6 pm Monday to Friday;
- 8 am to 1 pm Saturdays; and

at no time on Sundays and NSW public holidays.

1.2.2 Operations

Once commissioned, NES will operate 24 hours a day. The facility will be staffed during daylight hours, generally from:

• 7 am to 6 pm Monday to Friday (staff on-call during weekends and public holidays).

1.3 Purpose and scope of this plan

1.3.1 Overview

As part of the EIS, EMM Consulting Pty Limited (EMM) prepared an Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment report (ACHA) for the project, inclusive of an addendum report issued after the public exhibition phase in early 2019 (EMM 2018; 2019a; 2019b). The ACHA recommended that an Aboriginal heritage management plan (AHMP) be developed to manage post-approval conservation and mitigation of Aboriginal heritage within and adjacent to the development footprint. This AHMP has been prepared by EMM on behalf of ACEN Australia and in accordance with relevant Conditions of Approval (CoA) (

Table 1.2).

The primary purpose of this plan is to define management of Aboriginal heritage values within the development footprint. The term 'management' includes both Aboriginal heritage protection as well as mitigation of impacts on Aboriginal heritage. This AHMP includes:

- a list of all Aboriginal sites identified in the project boundary;
- management procedures for Aboriginal cultural heritage values within and adjacent to the project boundary;
- provisions for updates of Aboriginal site status and the status of management measures towards their completion;
- measures to ensure ongoing consultation with the project's registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) Heritage NSW regional archaeologist;
- protocols for RAP access arrangements for a selection of significant sites for educational purposes;
- protocols for educating staff and contractors of their obligations relating to Aboriginal cultural heritage values through a site induction process;
- protocols for newly identified sites;
- protocols for suspected human skeletal materials;
- protocols for the ongoing care of salvaged Aboriginal objects within a keeping place;
- reporting requirements and site database update requirements;

- provisions for continuous improvement to the plan through auditing and plan modification;
 and
- provisions for review and updates of the AHMP.

1.3.2 Area to which this plan applies

This AHMP applies to the project boundary as shown on Figure 1.2 and represents an envelope covering the development footprint of the two solar arrays and associated infrastructure. The AHMP also provides management measures for Aboriginal sites that occur on the border of the project boundary or extend beyond the project boundary. This AHMP also accounts for Aboriginal sites that were identified as part of archaeological investigations for Mod 2 but have been excluded from the development footprint/ project boundary – in these instances ACEN Australia has the obligation to advise relevant landholders about their responsibilities not to harm registered Aboriginal sites on their property.

The AHMP includes provisions for management measures that will take place outside the project boundary, including the establishment and maintenance of an Aboriginal keeping place and other post site salvage measures including the cataloguing, analysis, treatment and storage of Aboriginal objects.

1.3.3 Relevant conditions of consent

Conditions 17–19 of SSD-9255 address Aboriginal heritage requirements. The conditions listed in Table 1.2 refer to the relevant sections of this plan which address them.

1.3.4 Regulatory consultation

In accordance with CoA 19(b), EMM on behalf of ACEN Australia consulted with Heritage NSW regional archaeologist Roger Mehr and Uralla Shire Council (Council) on the AHMP. Consultation with the Aboriginal community is addressed in Section 2.

EMM initially contacted Heritage NSW on 27 March 2020 during the preparation of the AHMP via telephone. Key content items were discussed including the desired approach of Heritage NSW's review of the AHMP. Heritage NSW advised of their preference to review the AHMP after the RAP review period and its submission to DPE.

Heritage NSW provided their comments via letter on 28 October 2020 which was included in a package of documents that also included DPE's comments on the AHMP. Responses to these regulatory comments are provided in Appendix C2 which refers to sections of the AHMP that were updated to address the comments. ACEN Australia issued Council a draft of the AHMP on 19 August 2020 after the draft had been updated from the RAP review period. Council responded on 26 August 2020 stating that Council did not wish to provide comment on the AHMP (refer Appendix C3).


1.4 Authorship



2 Aboriginal consultation protocols

2.1 Registered Aboriginal Parties

There are nine Aboriginal groups registered for the project (Table 2.1). The RAPs were identified, registered and consulted as part of the ACHA (EMM 2018, 2019a, 2019b). Previous consultation included discussion of the management measures which were outlined in the ACHA and detailed in this AHMP.

2.2 Consultation process for the EIS

The following summary of the Aboriginal consultation process followed for the EIS is based on the more extensive account given in the ACHA (EMM 2018, 2019a, 2019b).

The Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents (DECCW 2010a) were used for the ACHA. RAPs were invited to provide cultural information about the study area, were provided with draft assessment and fieldwork methods for review and kept consulted about project updates and management via consultation meetings, letters and emails and provided with assessment documentation for review and comment. A summary of the main consultation components during the EIS phase is provided in Table 2.2.

2.3 Consultation in developing this plan

2.3.1 Initial plan development

In accordance with CoA 17 and 19(b), EMM consulted RAPs in developing this plan. Documentation of the consultation process is included in APPENDIX B.

Aboriginal consultation for this AHMP was approached in a manner consistent with the requirements set out in the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010* (DECCW 2010a). Consultation was undertaken with existing RAPs who have been involved in the consultation process since the preparation of the ACHA (refer Section 2.2).

RAPs were notified via letter about the intention for EMM to prepare the AHMP on 11 February 2020. The notification letter outlined the consultation process for the AHMP and identified key matters to be discussed for the AHMP.

A draft of this AHMP was provided to all of the RAPs on 15 May 2020 allowing for a 28 day review period. The draft report included highlighted text indicating sections where RAP input was sought in reference to particular management decisions, such as the keeping place location. RAPs were also issued with a cover letter explaining the review process and highlighting where key input was sought.

A consultation meeting between RAPs, EMM and ACEN Australia during the AHMP review period was originally planned to discuss the contents of the AHMP, focusing on the details of specific management measures. However, due to COVID-19, the meeting was cancelled for the health and safety of all stakeholders. Notwithstanding, feedback on the AHMP was still sought in writing and/or via telephone.

Responses were received by Nganywana Clan Group (Les Ahoy), Nunawanna Aboriginal Corporation (Colin Ahoy Snr. And Colin Ahoy Jr.) and Iwatta Aboriginal Corporation (Steven Ahoy). A summary of RAP submissions and outcomes relating to the AHMP are presented in Table 2.3.

The submission reiterated the input provided in the NES ACHA that the project area is likely to be part of Aboriginal meeting place Ooralla (Section 7.2 of EMM 2019a).

Overall the submission requested that the AHMP "take into consideration the non-tangible aspects which even though cannot be measured from a scientific perspective, should be inclusive from a traditional oral Aboriginal historical perspective of teaching and passing on culture through the process of storytelling, dance and such gathering as with Ooralla site. It has just as much historical importance to me as an Aboriginal Cultural Knowledge Holder as do the artefacts found at this location."

EMM acknowledge that the AHMP is structured in a way that sets out the management of primarily archaeological material associated with the project. We would like to emphasise that the AHMP is structured in a practical way to set out management requirements rather than being a cultural heritage assessment, which was previously completed in 2019 (EMM 2019a). Section 7.2 of the project ACHA (EMM 2019a) includes reference to Ooralla and Les Ahoy's original submission about Ooralla is included in Appendix A of the ACHA.

Notwithstanding, EMM acknowledges that the submission highlights that the focus of Aboriginal heritage management in the draft was on archaeological management and did not set out avenues for oral history recording and other measures that facilitates the teaching of cultural values to the Aboriginal community about Ooralla.

EMM contacted Les Ahoy on 3 July 2020 to discuss his desired outcomes to accommodate more emphasis on intangible cultural aspects of the project area. The primary outcomes of the discussion were the request for appropriate acknowledgement of country through signage

2.3.2 AHMP revisions

2.3.2.1 AHMP revision 1

In March 2021, EMM/ ACEN Australia initiated consultation with RAPs regarding proposed changes to the approved AHMP in accordance with the consultation protocols set out in Section 2.4.1 of this plan. The revised AHMP was in relation to proposed changes to project heritage management measures and involved updates to the following sections: Section 4.2.2 (ii) Barriers, Section 4.3.1 (iii) Additional requirements for unsuccessful site collection attempts, and Section 4.3.1 (iii) Additional collection for Aboriginal stone hatchets. Details of RAP consultation for this revision is presented in Appendix B3.

Additionally, during this AHMP revision period, EMM/ ACEN Australia consulted RAPs regarding proposed methods for further preservation and display of salvaged Aboriginal scar tree NE49. These measures were conducted in accordance with the existing AHMP provisions in Section 4.3.2 of the AHMP. Details of this consultation are provided in Appendix B3.

2.3.3 AHMP revision 2

The second AHMP revision was in relation to required AHMP updates resulting from Mod 2 approval. It also provided ACEN Australia with the opportunity to update the Aboriginal site inventory and relevant sections to account for the salvage and management measures completed to date.

RAPs were provided with a draft of the updated AHMP on 13 September 2023 for review and feedback. Feedback was sought via email correspondence and during an Aboriginal focus group meeting held between ACEN and registered parties on 19 September 2023¹.

The intent of the focus group meeting was to a) provide an overview of draft updates to the AHMP in response to Modification 2 approval granted by the NSW Government in May 2023 and b) seek feedback from registered parties on the AHMP updates. Feedback was received verbally during the meeting and subsequently via email during the 14 day AHMP review period.

During the focus group meeting, the project archaeologist provided an overview of key updates to the draft AHMP with visual aids of Aboriginal site management mapping. A summary of Modification 2 ACHA was provided along with an overview of the changes to AHMP that were needed to bring the AHMP up to date with the progress of management tasks that have been implemented since the last document revision.

The key topics discussed during this meeting, registered party comments and ACEN's responses are detailed in in Appendix B4. Appendix B4 provides further information about which sections have been updated as a result of the consultation process.

2.4 Ongoing consultation

2.4.1 All RAPs to be kept informed

The RAPs will continue to be consulted on matters of Aboriginal heritage management for the project. Primary communication will be via letter which may be emailed or posted depending on RAP preferred means of communication. Issues raised in conversations, whether by telephone or in person, should be documented in a letter by the person raising the issue within a reasonable time of the conversation. Only suitably documented issues will be subject to further action by ACEN Australia with the RAPs.

Instances where consultation is required is set out throughout this report. In summary, consultation will be undertaken for (but may not be limited to) the following circumstances:

- when making changes to this plan, including the circumstances that trigger required changes to the plan (refer Section 7.2.3) (note this also requires notification to Heritage NSW as specified in Section 7.2.3);
- when additional Aboriginal heritage assessment, investigation, protection or mitigation is required for the project; and
- when new Aboriginal sites and/or potential ancestral remains are discovered and input on their management is required (refer Section 5). Note that Section 5 requires Heritage NSW to be notified where specified in relation to new sites and/or potential ancestral remains.

ACEN Australia will be responsible for consulting with the RAPs. Issues requiring the attention of RAPs will be communicated no later than one week of the issue arising. Feedback from RAPs is required no later than two weeks from the date correspondence is issued by ACEN Australia.

2.4.2 Access to Aboriginal sites and objects

In accordance with CoA19(c), special provisions are included in the AHMP for Aboriginal community access arrangements to Aboriginal grinding groove sites NE09 and NE68. The primary aims of Aboriginal community access of these sites will be to achieve intergenerational equity through maintaining a cultural connection to Country and using the sites as cultural education tools.

Local Aboriginal community site visitation access to NE09 and NE68 will be subject to the following provisions:

- visitation access will be provided during the operational phase of the project (after construction is fully completed), in line with all safety and security requirements;
- access must comply with the facility's operational work health and safety (WHS)
 requirements, including appropriate travel to the Aboriginal heritage sites and an ACEN
 Australia or Operations and Maintenance (O&M) contractor site escort, if applicable;
- all visitors must log their attendance on a register made available by ACEN Australia/the O&M contractor to all RAPs (held on site);

- RAPs must give at least two business days' notice to ACEN Australia or its delegate (O&M contractor or alternative) about their intent to access the site and which sites will be visited (NE09 and/or NE68);
- a RAP member may escort other members of the local Aboriginal community or other persons for research or educational reasons, on the condition that all proposed attendees give at least two business days' written notice;
- local Aboriginal community members seeking access to NE09 and/or NE68 without a RAP
 escort must receive prior written endorsement from one of the RAPs which identifies the
 name of the person, briefly describes their basis of interest and nominates the timeframe for
 access to the Aboriginal sites in order to provide confidence to ACEN Australia or their
 delegate and RAPs that the access request is authentic. One week's notice will need to be
 provided to ACEN Australia or its delegate.

At ACEN Australia/its contractor's discretion, local Aboriginal community access to Aboriginal sites other than NE09 and NE68 on land managed by ACEN Australia may be made available subject to reasonable WHS and security requirements being met; landowner permission (if applicable) being obtained; the sites being located within the facility's boundary; at least one weeks' prior notification; and availability of ACEN Australia or O&M contractor staff to provide supervision.

Access to stored Aboriginal objects will be provided subject to the procedures described for the keeping place detailed in Section 4.2.4 In summary, for security purposes the Aboriginal objects must not be removed from their storage location; however, should be available for those wanting to view the material, subject to keeping place space protocols. A keeping place visitor log book must be signed by persons accessing stored Aboriginal objects and the persons must have prior RAP endorsement – this log book will be kept and maintained by the keeping place manager (not ACEN Australia/O&M contractor).

2.4.3 Aboriginal involvement in Aboriginal heritage management measures

ACEN Australia will give consideration to expressions of interest from suitably skilled, equipped and insured Aboriginal persons to provide services to protect and maintain Aboriginal sites in active protection areas (refer Section 4.2.2).

RAPs will be invited to provide a fieldwork representative to participate in the preliminary demarcation of active avoidance areas and salvage activities as described in 4 under contractual arrangement with ACEN Australia. Depending on the scope of specific management tasks, RAP fieldwork representatives may be required to work to a roster in an equal manner consistent with that employed during the ACHA. All fieldwork management tasks will include at least one project archaeologist and will work in accordance with this plan.

RAPs will also be invited to assist in relevant Aboriginal heritage related fieldwork related to additional assessments as outlined in Section 6.5, where required.

3 Aboriginal sites and objects

3.1 Overview

The Aboriginal cultural heritage values related to the project were identified during the preparation of the ACHA and modifications through archaeological investigation and Aboriginal community consultation with RAPs (EMM 2018, 2019a, 2019b, 2022). This section provides an overview of the Aboriginal sites and Aboriginal socio-cultural values relevant to the project as detailed in the ACHA and additional assessments to support project modifications.

3.2 Socio-cultural values

During ACHA preparation, the RAPs were consulted to determine whether any socio-cultural or historic heritage value relates specifically to the study area more broadly regardless of archaeological evidence. The general consensus was that, prior to the survey, RAPs did not know of the location of specific sites within the broader study area but were told by their Elders that such site types may exist within the landscape. RAPs acknowledged that this was partly due to the physical and cultural dislocation from the landscape faced by local Aboriginal people after colonial settlement.


Overall, the Aboriginal community has identified that heritage values in the study area are directly linked with the Aboriginal sites identified during the survey. No specific historical connection has been linked to the identified sites apart from a broader notion that the study area may have formed part of what was known as Oorala, a local Anaiwan word meaning "a camp", "meeting place" or "a place where people come together" (EMM 2018, p.92).

Aboriginal sites with archaeological evidence are all of value to the Aboriginal community through the tangible connection that they represent with pre-colonial Aboriginal land use. Although all Aboriginal sites have significance to the Aboriginal community, RAPs repeatedly emphasised the importance of grinding groove and open camp site NE09 primarily for its high aesthetic and educational values and also the prominent tangible link it provides the Aboriginal community with their ancestors.

3.3 Aboriginal sites

A total of 117 Aboriginal sites were identified during the course of archaeological investigations for the project, inclusive of the ACHA addendum investigations and assessments for Mod 1 and Mod 2 (EMM 2018, 2019a, 2019b, 2022). Aboriginal sites were identified and assessed through targeted archaeological survey, targeted test excavation and expert assessment of a selection of potential Aboriginal scar trees. Through project design revisions, resulting in the removal of the southern array area during the initial EIS and Mod 2 revisions that excluded surveyed areas from the project boundary there are 86 Aboriginal sites within the project boundary that require management under this plan. The Aboriginal sites and their required management is shown on Figure 3.1 and in further detail on Figure 3.1A to 3.1F. Details for the management of the 86 sites are presented in Chapter 4 and a summary of management measures are listed in Appendix A. Site details and their management status are kept digitally in the NES Aboriginal Heritage Database as detailed in Section 7.3.

The location and extent of Aboriginal sites are represented by GIS data shown on Figure 3.1 and 3.1 A to 3.1F. Sites are either represented as 'point' data, or point data encompassed by polygons representing 'site areas'. Site points and site areas represent the spatial extent of the visible Aboriginal objects. Potential archaeological deposit (PAD) areas ('PAD areas') are also shown as GIS polygons and represent the predicted extent of concentrated subsurface Aboriginal objects in a particular area. PAD areas have been supported through extrapolations made from archaeological test excavation and are assigned to landforms that are distinguishable from the surrounding landscape as being likely to retain higher artefact densities than the assumed 'background scatter' of archaeological material in the broader landscape.



4 Aboriginal heritage management

4.1 Overview - management of known sites

Aboriginal heritage management over the life of the project will primarily take the form of either protective measures for avoided sites, or salvage as mitigation for sites that will be impacted.

Aboriginal sites close to the development footprint that are not salvaged but are scheduled for protection from project impacts will be actively protected. Active protection measures will vary depending on site type and other specific requirements.

All surface artefact sites (artefact scatters and isolated finds) impacted by the project will be collected. This will involve collecting the entire visible contents of 27 isolated artefacts and 7 artefact scatters. One felled and sawn in half Aboriginal scar tree, NE49, has also been collected. Notwithstanding the intention of collection, this will be subject to successfully locating and identifying the artefacts which may have moved since first identified, for example due to being disturbed by grazing stock, stormwater runoff etc.

Ongoing management will be required for scarred tree sites, grinding groove sites NE09 and NE68, and salvaged archaeological material. This will be completed with the involvement of RAPs and suitably qualified archaeologists. A summary of the Aboriginal sites identified in the project boundary, how each of the sites will be managed, and their current management status is presented in Appendix A.

4.2 Aboriginal heritage protection

4.2.1 Active or passive protection

Aboriginal sites that are not identified as being impacted by the ACHA will be protected. Either active or passive protection measures will be implemented. Active management means construction of temporary or permanent barriers, installation of signage and controls on access by those undertaking activities within the project boundary. Passive management means no fencing or signage will be applied as the sites are at limited risk of inadvertent impacts because they are a suitable distance from the development footprint.

4.2.2 Active protection close to development footprint

4.2.2.1 Overview

The sites scheduled for avoidance within, or within 20 m of, the development footprint will be managed through active protection using stakes and wire fencing for scarred trees and grinding groove sites, and bollards or wire fencing supported on concrete blocks for the remaining sites to provide active protection during project construction. Additionally, the highly significant Aboriginal grinding groove site NE09 will be managed through active protection despite the site area occurring over 100 m from the development footprint.

4.2.2.1.1 Barriers

Barriers (either bollards or wire fencing) will be erected prior to construction occurring in the vicinity of the relevant sites. Fencing will be on the boundaries marked by the project archaeologist and at least one RAP representative with assistance by a qualified surveyor or fencing contractor. These boundaries will be guided by Aboriginal site 'point', 'site area' and 'PAD area' GIS data layers contained in the New England Solar Farm Aboriginal Heritage Database (NES AH Database).

The barriers and fencing will incorporate a 20 m minimum buffer from site features (eg no additional buffer is required from PAD area boundaries). There are special provisions for grinding groove sites NE09 owing to their high cultural value warranting a greater visual buffer so that they can be appreciated in context with the natural landscape. A construction buffer of 100 m will be applied to the 'site area' boundaries of NE09 beyond their fenced boundaries.

Note 1: This section has been amended to remove the 100 m construction buffer previously applied to NE68. Upon review of project design and layout, ACEN Australia have aimed to maintain existing vegetation on site where feasible. This will require trenching north of the pine tree wind row that lines Big Ridge Road, which would otherwise require clearance if the 100 m buffer was applied to NE68's southern boundary. This activity will require trenching works only, which is necessary for cabling (underground) as part of the project design. This will not affect the original intention of the buffer, which was to serve as a visual buffer from project elements applied to the site for landscape views to assist in future RAP access and visitation for cultural and learning experiences. Moreover, NE68 has a north, north-westerly aspect overlooking a drainage feature which will not be impacted visually or by project construction. Maintaining the wind row of trees along Big Ridge Rd, where possible, will maintain a visual barrier to the substation when viewed from NE68. As such, the proposed change will not result in additional visual or cultural object impacts and the original significant site curtilage will be retained.

The 'PAD boundary' for NE68 now represents the avoidance area for this site. No known stone artefacts or grinding grooves will be disturbed by this proposed change, as the PAD area already incorporates a buffer beyond the recorded site features which are within a concentration of outcropping silcrete bedrock expanses. ACEN Australia would like to note that a 100 m visual buffer referred to in the ACHA will still be maintained as to not affect the curtilage of the site, however underground works will need to be installed within 100 m of NE68 but still outside of the PAD boundary.

Note 2: fencing boundary for NE96 (dead scarred tree) has reduced to 10m to accommodate the site access and electrical cabling easement. This buffer was established during Stage 2a October 2022 fieldwork with RAPs and demarcated by stakes which were logged by a surveyor. This modified boundary still allows adequate protection of the tree. Table A1 reflects this management measure for NE96.

The fencing contractor will be guided by boundary markers according to spatial data and/or mapping provided by the project archaeologist.

A durable sign will be attached to the fencing including words to the effect of:

- Environmentally sensitive area
- Do not disturb
- Contact the Project Manager on [phone number].

At the end of construction, ACEN Australia will assess the need for ongoing active protection of the sites given operations of the facility is low impact. If ACEN Australia determines that the site does not require active protection during operations, ACEN Australia may remove the barriers with the exception of scarred tree and grinding groove sites.

4.2.2.1.2 Weed management within wire and stake protected areas

Aboriginal sites subject to protective wire and stake fencing will require ongoing weed management to ensure the sites are not impacted by grass and weed infestation. This will require non-invasive weed management measures such as slashing, weeding, treatment with weed control products to prevent grass and weed overgrowth.

As per Section 2.4.3, where is practical and feasible to employ suitably qualified and certified Aboriginal person(s) if required for weed management activities relating to the Aboriginal sites, ACEN Australia and/or its contractors will aim to prioritize this.

Areas protected by bollards will have sufficient spaces left to allow grazing animals to continue to manage vegetation growth. These areas only comprise open stone artefact sites in existing ploughed and grazed paddocks, so the continuation of animal grazing is considered a suitable management strategy.

4.2.2.1.3 Provisions for protected Aboriginal scar trees

The 12 identified standing Aboriginal scar trees within the project boundary will be avoided through stake and wire active protection measures. Additional management is required to address their long-term management given that all examples are dead trees and most are in a highly deteriorated condition. The following long-term measures will be undertaken:

- After active protection measures are implemented the trees will be left in-situ to weather naturally.
- The trees will be inspected at five-year intervals to assess the trees' condition. The inspection
 will identify any structural and material issues with the trees. Alternatively, if structural or
 material issues are observed outside of these monitoring timeframes, RAPs and an
 archaeologist will be notified to determine if the step listed below is warranted.
- If through natural events or other unforeseen circumstances, the tree(s) break, fall or deteriorate beyond preservation, the tree(s) will be offered to the Aboriginal community (RAPs) for salvage and relocation to the Aboriginal keeping place as specified in Section 4.2.4. RAPs may decline the offer to salvage the tree(s) depending on the condition of the tree. If salvage is possible and desired by RAPs, salvage will involve sawing the tree at a suitable buffer above and below the scar(s) and extracting the scarred section. Any salvaged trees to be kept in the keeping place will be subject to the same provisions as specified for Aboriginal tree NE49.
- The duration of ACEN Australia's management commitments for the trees will be limited to the life of the project's operation.

Update as of June 2023:

 Scar Tree Site NE67 was identified by EMM as collapsed and deteriorated beyond salvage in January 2021 during fieldwork with RAPs. RAPs considered the tree to be in a condition beyond salvage and did not nominate to salvage the tree (refer consultation material in Appendix B3). As such, unmitigated impacts over the site area applies.

- During AHMP site boundary demarcation and surface artefact collection fieldwork for project Stage 2, archaeologists and RAP field officers noted damage to some scarred trees: NE102, NE23 and NE25 had fallen and were severely deteriorated, and NE72 and NE97 were not relocatable presumedly because they had deteriorated beyond recognition and were not discernible from surrounding fallen trees and branches in the landscape. This quick series of site deteriorations was attributed to recent years of regular rain and soil moisture that rotted many of the tree's structural roots. RAPs were consulted about these issues in October 2022 and March 2023 and considered that salvage was not suitable and did not nominate to salvage the trees (refer consultation material in Appendix B3). As such, their management requirements have been updated and are shown in Appendix A.
- Of the above trees, only NE102 had been fenced as it is within the project Stage 1 area, while the remaining tree locations are within the project Stage 2 area and had not undergone management. ACEN Australia is committed to keeping the NE102 fenced area and exploring opportunities with RAPs to undergo contemporary cultural scarring as a means to continue cultural practices at a location where an Aboriginal scar tree had fallen. Scarring would be undertaken by RAP representatives and would follow a culturally appropriate procedure at an existing native tree within the fenced area. Additionally, interpretative signage would be installed at NE102 to acknowledge the fallen tree and the contemporary cultural practice.
- ACEN Australia has developed an ongoing site visual condition assessment program with RAPs which includes provisions to audit tree condition on a monthly basis so that suitable management measures can be carried out with the aim to prevent tree collapse or salvage trees that face imminent collapse. The site visual condition assessment checklist template is included in Appendix F.

4.2.3 Passive protection away from project activities

Passive management will apply to the Aboriginal sites identified for avoidance on land within the project boundary but over 20 m from the development footprint. While no fencing, signage or active land management measures are proposed for these sites, their locations are kept on the NES AH Database for persons working on or visiting the project boundary. If within the project boundary (under the responsibility of ACEN Australia), their presence in the landscape will be demarcated by at least one high visibility peg, stake or other marker to alert persons to their location. These locations will be marked by the project archaeologist and at least one RAP representative.

For sites identified during the course of investigations for the project that fall outside the project boundary, ACEN Australia will notify relevant landholders that Aboriginal sites are recorded on their property and there is the obligation not to harm those Aboriginal objects under the NPW Act. ACEN Australia will provide relevant landholders with mapping of these sites to assist their identification and avoidance.

4.2.4 Keeping place and reburial of salvaged material

A keeping place is a designated long-term secure area for the purpose of storing and curating Aboriginal cultural materials and their associated documentation.

Recovered stone artefacts will be temporarily stored at a designated location during cataloguing and analysis. At the completion of cataloguing and analysis, the recovered objects will be

transferred to a long-term facility. A dedicated storage facility has been established at the Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place (96-104 Kentucky Street, Armidale NSW). The storage and management of Aboriginal objects here is approved under Care Agreement 5045 which was issued by Heritage NSW on 14 March 2023.

The keeping place will store a representative sample of the Aboriginal stone artefacts collected and excavated as part of the project. The keeping place also stores Aboriginal scar tree NE49 and any other unexpected finds salvaged under the AHMP.

A suitable sample of collected artefacts, as advised by RAP representatives, will be made available for display in a display case. The display case will include relevant signage for contextual, informational and educational purposes. The keeping place will also include facilities for inspecting the materials including appropriate table, chairs and lighting.

Where objects are too large for inside storage, they may be installed in a suitably secure location on the grounds of the keeping place with interpretative signage.

All associated reports and records bound in a hard copy and digital form will be stored in the same location as the salvaged artefacts.

All stored materials are to be held in locked cabinets with access managed by the keeping place manager or delegate in accordance with instructions by RAPs. The cabinet is to be clearly labelled with the contents and conditions for access.

The selection of salvaged materials will be retained at the keeping place for the life of the project unless otherwise determined by RAPs and approved by Heritage NSW a Section 85 Care Agreement.

After salvage collection activities, cataloguing and the selection of display materials, the RAPs may consider it appropriate to rebury surplus material on Country. If reburial is determined by RAPs, the location of the reburial will be decided upon in consultation with ACEN Australia and relevant Landholders if applicable. Any location chosen will need to be suitable for long term conservation and not be at risk of any foreseeable impacts.

The reburial activity would be guided by the stone artefact disposition procedures as set out in Section 3.7 of the *Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in NSW* (DECCW 2010).

Any reburial fieldwork will be undertaken by a qualified archaeologist so that it is recorded appropriately. RAPs who wish to be involved in the activity will also be requested to participate.

If the nominated keeping place closes or can no longer accommodate the project Aboriginal objects, consideration of an alternative location will be determined with RAP consultation. Where no facility can be identified, the material should be reburied within the project boundary in a secure manner that allows later retrieval at a location notified to DPE and Heritage NSW in the designated manner.

4.2.5 Care Agreement

The NSW *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (NPW Act) provides for the transfer of Aboriginal objects to Aboriginal owners. Aboriginal owners are defined in the Act as persons whose names are entered on the Register of Aboriginal Owners because of the persons' cultural association with

particular land under the NSW *Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983*². If Aboriginal owners under this definition cannot be identified, a Care Agreement can facilitate the transfer to other persons.

A NPW Section 85a 'Care Agreement' has been entered into with Heritage NSW and the Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place (96-104 Kentucky Street, Armidale NSW) Care Agreement 5045, attached as Appendix E, which allows for the transfer to the facility for safekeeping. The Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place is the custodian for the purposes of safekeeping, with a person delegated from the Board of Custodians being the responsible person.

4.3 Aboriginal heritage salvage measures

4.3.1 Surface artefact collection

4.3.1.1 Method

Salvage surface collection of all Aboriginal sites in the development footprint will be completed by the project archaeologist and RAP representatives. This will be undertaken prior to any ground disturbance related to the project in the vicinity of the Aboriginal sites.

Additionally, based on the outcomes of RAP consultation, the surface artefact of site NE10 has been collected despite not being within the development footprint (refer Table 4.1).

The collection will be undertaken by qualified archaeologists and RAP representatives. The collection method will be as follows:

- 1. Site coordinates and area polygons for each site will be entered into mobile GPS devices to re-locate and confirm the location. It is noted that it may not be possible to find all of the recorded artefacts.
- 2. The general vicinity of each site location will be inspected by the field team. Stone artefacts will be flagged on the ground and a photo taken of the flagged site. Each flagged artefact will be marked as a waypoint in the GPS.
- 3. All artefacts will be collected into snap lock plastic bags or similar, marked with the project name, site name, collection date and waypoint number.
- 4. All artefacts will be sorted and recorded post-fieldwork with respect to technological type, implement type, raw material, maximum block length and weight.
- 5. The collected artefacts will be incorporated into a salvage report detailing the results of the fieldwork, the artefacts recovered at each site and GIS figures showing the artefact locations.
- 6. The Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) records will be updated with a site impact recording form for each collected site.

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There is currently no such defined registered Aboriginal owner for the project to whom the Aboriginal objects can be transferred.

4.3.1.2 Additional requirements for unsuccessful site collection attempts

4.3.1.2.1 Overview

In January 2021, EMM and RAPs attempted to collect all 32 stone artefact sites designated with the salvage collection management measure. However, not all stone artefact sites were possible to collect due to ground visibility constraints associated with extensive grass and weed growth since the original site identification surveys; and natural environmental factors that may have resulted in the movement and/or loss of previously identified cultural materials.

The artefacts of 21 sites could not be re-located for collection (status incomplete), and two sites only had a portion of their contents collected (status partially collected). These 23 sites required further management provisions prior to project development.

EMM assessed the condition and contents of each site to put forward potential management measures for RAP consideration via an updated draft of the AHMP. The potential measures were also the outcome of discussions with RAPs during fieldwork. Only one response from RAPs (Armidale and New England Gumbaynggirr Descendants) which proposed an alternative method. EMM/ACEN Australia's response to this submission is provided in Appendix B.

Overall, RAPs indicated that an additional attempt to salvage the outstanding sites was warranted and ACEN Australia accommodated this request under an updated AHMP (AHMP Revision 1). As such, 22 sites of the 23 sites underwent further collection attempts in July 2021 as outlined below. The remaining site NE13 is outside of the project footprint and will be managed as passive avoidance.

4.3.1.2.2 Additional collection attempts - vegetation clearance and raking

ACEN Australia proposes that a method with as minimal ground disturbance as possible is employed in attempts relocate and salvage nominated sites (refer to sites listed as 'surface collection (additional attempt)' in Table 4.1A1). Further management attempts may be staged but must occur prior to ground disturbance related to the project in the vicinity of the Aboriginal site.

- 1. ACEN Australia will engage a landscape maintenance/management contractor to clear vegetation over the site areas. This may be achieved using a combination of mechanical slashing, mowing and line trimmer (as required). An archaeologist and RAP representatives (as engaged per Section 2.4.3) will monitor the vegetation clearance and provide guidance to ensure it is employed to a level satisfactory to reveal the ground surface for the identification of Aboriginal objects.
- 2. The vegetation clearance will cover the mapped site area of the relevant sites. For isolated finds without mapped site areas, this will require clearing an area of up to approximately 10 m x 10 m over the original site coordinates.
- 3. Following vegetation clearance, RAPs and an archaeologist will inspect the cleared areas. If the artefacts are not identified through vegetation clearance alone, the RAPs and an archaeologist will use suitably fine gauged steel rakes over the areas to reveal artefacts for collection.
- 4. Any artefacts identified within these areas will be recorded and collected in accordance with the surface artefact collection method in this AHMP.

5. Regardless of whether stone artefacts are identified during this process, no further collection attempts or mitigation measures will be required after the exercise is completed for each relevant site (with the exception of Stage 2a sites as detailed in Section 4.3.1.3). Following this procedure, the management status of these sites will be regarded as completed and project related development may proceed without further heritage measures.

4.3.1.3 Additional measure – community collection grader scrapes

4.3.1.3.1 Overview

The additional measure detailed in this section was in response to RAP feedback about the limited success of prior surface collection attempts and vegetation clearance/raking employed for Stage 2a sites in October 2022 whereby only artefacts at 4 out of 9 sites were identified and collected using this method.

ACEN acknowledges that RAPs wish to pursue every reasonable option to salvage the stone artefact sites within the project development footprint. ACEN proposes community collection grader scrapes to response to RAP feedback (refer Appendix B4).

The adoption of grader scrapes to expose the under-lying soil profile has been periodically adopted in NSW in the past, but is highly destructive to cultural deposits and typically lacks spatial or stratigraphic control of any identified cultural materials. As such, in more recent years, it is generally not supported by archaeologists nor Heritage NSW as an archaeological method to explore potential archaeological deposits (PADs). However, here the approach is proposed by the Aboriginal participants who wish to improve visibility and recover their cultural materials where surface artefacts were previously recorded, with less concern for the exact provenance or location of them. As such, it has been included here as a mitigation measure, noting that these areas are not predicated to feature cultural deposits that would meet the definition of PAD.

4.3.1.3.2 Community collection grader scrapes

The following method applies to Stage 2a sites that have been scheduled for surface artefact collection. These 11 sites are:

- NE03
- NE18
- NE20
- NE59
- NE74
- NE75
- NE76
- NE88
- NE98
- NE99
- NE119

Works may be staged but must occur prior to ground disturbance related to the project in the vicinity (within 50 m) of each Aboriginal site. The following process will be undertaken:

1. Site coordinates on handheld GPS devices will be used to find the site location.

- 2. Within an area of approximately 10 m x 10 m, a machine grader (or similar machine) will be employed to scrape the ground surface to remove surface vegetation and a limited amount of topsoil. Multiple grader passes may be employed but the depth of grading should not exceed ~50 cm depth, bedrock, or clay (whichever comes first). Grading would only exceed ~50 cm depth if the project archaeologist and RAPs on site consider it reasonable and justifiable to continue.
- 3. This process will be monitored by RAP representatives and an archaeologist and will involve inspection of the ground surface and grader windows after each pass of the grader machine over the ~10 m x 10 m area.
- 4. If artefacts are identified within these areas, the surface artefact collection method as set out in Section 4.3.1.1 of the ACHMP will be employed.
- 5. After the grader scrapes are completed, the machine will distribute graded soil back over the inspected area to level the area again.
- 6. Regardless of whether stone artefacts are identified during this process, no further measures will be required after the exercise is completed for each relevant site. Following this procedure, the management status of these sites will be regarded as completed and project related development may proceed without further heritage measures.

4.3.2 Additional collection for Aboriginal stone hatchets

Through ongoing Aboriginal consultation, a selection of RAPs has requested that all Aboriginal stone hatchets (i.e. stone artefacts with evidence of flaking as 'blanks' or with ground edges) within the project area be collected for deposition and display at the nominated keeping place. Some of these have been collected as part of the 32 artefact sites designated with a salvage collection management measure. However, the remaining stone hatchets are associated with sites designated for avoidance. As part of the updated AHMP, all outstanding hatchets will have collection attempts in accordance with Section 4.3.1. However, if during the initial collection attempts at these sites are unsuccessful due to poor ground surface visibility, then the sites will be left in-situ. In this scenario RAPs and ACEN Australia may consult about future collection attempts when visibility conditions may improve in the future.

The details of the stone hatchets identified during the archaeological survey phase of the ACHA are summarised in Table 4.1. Additionally, Table 4.1 features information relevant to the outcomes of a recent DPE compliance investigation regarding the unauthorised collection and movement of stone hatchets across archaeological sites within the project area (January–February 2021). The outcome resulted in four stone hatchets being placed within the site boundary of grinding groove site NE09 as an interim protective measure. In January–February 2021 during the compliance investigation, EMM identified that two of the four moved hatchets were from sites NE87 and NE50, but the remaining two hatchets could not be associated with any existing site. In April 2021, EMM conducted further review of AHIMs site card data, our internal site information databases, and photographic records to investigate the provenance of the two unknown items. EMM determined that one of the hatchets is from site potential hatch quarry site NE83. However, the final unknown item could not be identified through the review process. As such, the object is still likely to have derived from the project area, but further contextual information cannot be speculated.

Two of the four moved stone hatchets at NE09 have been collected as part of the Stage 1 surface salvage collection in January and July 2021 (NE 87 and NE50), while two were collected in October 2021 (NE83 – stone hatch 1, and stone hatch with unknown provenance). The 'management status' column of Table 4.1 provides further detail of the collected items. The updated management status information is tracked in the management inventory (Appendix A).

Additionally, any previously unrecorded stone hatchet artefacts identified in the future within existing site boundaries also have the provision to be recorded, collected, catalogued and transferred to the nominated keeping place.

4.3.2.1 Analysis

Collected artefacts will be catalogued in a database with the basic attributes of each artefact recorded. Analysis of collected stone artefacts will include:

- initial sorting and cleaning of salvaged material;
- establishment of a computer database to record artefact provenance; and
- measuring and recording basic artefact attributes, comprising:
 - o artefact type;

- raw material type;
- o maximum length;
- o weight; and
- o implement type (if applicable).

The analysis team will comprise of the project archaeologist and assisting archaeologists.

4.3.2.2 Reporting

A salvage report will be prepared describing the work and including a catalogue of all recovered Aboriginal objects. The report will be prepared with reference to the findings of the ACHA. The report will be prepared upon the completion of salvage activities set for known sites in this plan and will be completed within one year of completion of salvage activities.

The salvage report will be distributed to RAPs and Heritage NSW's AHIMS database for their records.

4.3.3 Aboriginal scar tree removal

The felled and sawn in half Aboriginal scar tree, NE49, will be salvaged prior to project construction. The salvage method for the tree will be as follows:

- A suitably qualified person in scar tree management (eg archaeologist with scar tree specialisation, arbor-culturalist or arborist) will be engaged to determine a suitable removal method in consultation with RAPs. This may involve the requirement to saw the tree above the scar location allowing a suitable buffer from the scar feature. The process of removal will be photographed.
- The removed tree and scar may be treated to preserve the scar to prevent its further deterioration. Any treatment option would be completed in consultation with RAPs, ACEN Australia and a suitably qualified curator.
- The tree will be relocated to the Aboriginal keeping place as specified in Section 4.2.4 and appropriately displayed using suitable materials in consultation with ACEN Australia and RAPs.

The outcomes of the tree management activity will be documented in a short letter report including records of the original and new tree location.

The AHIMS records will be updated with a site impact recording form for the site.

August 2022 update:

Note: the salvage activity for NE49 was completed in January 2021. The tree is on display in an appropriate cabinet at the keeping place.

4.4 Cultural interpretation and recording of oral histories

The request for cultural interpretation measures and the recording of oral histories was raised through Aboriginal consultation in developing this plan (refer submission from Nganyawana Cultural Consultants in Table 2.3.

Interpretative signage will be installed within the proposed fence area of grinding groove site NE09. The final location, content, medium and design of the signage will be prepared in consultation with RAPs and may involve contracting a qualified interpretive design company facilitate the task. This signage will be installed within one year after project construction is completed and access is made available to RAPs and the community.

ACEN Australia will also explore opportunities to incorporate an acknowledgement of Country into signage for the solar farm entrance, subject to location and project design considerations.

An oral history based on Aboriginal knowledge holder information about Ooralla will be recorded and stored at the Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place. This will involve interviewing interested and willing RAP knowledge holders (such as Les Ahoy from Nganyawana Cultural Consultants) via audio and/or video mediums. The content of oral histories would be at the direction and discretion of knowledge holders. All documented material will be stored on archival quality digital mediums and stored at the nominated keeping place in association will salvaged archaeological material. The availability of this information to the broader community would be at the discretion of the knowledge provider or delegated person.

June 2023 update:

In March 2022 ACEN Australia commissioned the filming and production of a video documenting oral histories from the local Aboriginal community including interviews with RAPs. Interviews were undertaken by anthropologist Dr. Philip Clarke. A video "Ooralla: A Collection of Cultural Stories from First Nations" was also produced which features a compilation of the interviews and other On Country content. This video is publicly accessible on YouTube© and can be viewed at the following weblink: https://youtu.be/XJ1E5YHq5pl

Individual interviews are still undergoing review and editing prior to final publishing.

5 New finds procedures

5.1 Discovery of new Aboriginal sites

In the event of discovery of new Aboriginal sites within the project boundary (outside of previously identified Aboriginal site and PAD areas), the following will apply:

- a minimum of 10 m around the site will be secured to protect the find with temporary fencing.
 The temporary fencing will be colour specific that is not used for any other purpose on site.
 The find will be immediately reported to the work supervisor who will immediately advise the ACEN Australia HSE Manager or other nominated senior staff member;
- formal notification will be made to the Stage 1b Contractor Operations Manager and the Stage 2a EPC Contractor Project Manager by the ACEN Australia HSE Manager highlighting the potential find;
- signage will be installed along the 10m exclusion zone to identify the potential new find;
- an archaeologist must be contacted at the earliest opportunity from the date of the find to validate the find, determine the archaeological significance of the objects(s) and confirm whether the 10 m buffer is appropriate;
- if the object is determined not to be an Aboriginal object by the archaeologist, works may continue upon receipt of a written confirmation by the project archaeologist;
- if considered cultural, the site will be recorded in accordance with current best practice archaeological methods and guidelines;
- assessments of archaeological significance will be documented in a letter report in a manner consistent with the significance assessment for the ACHA (EMM 2018; 2019a);
- if the find is determined to be an Aboriginal object, RAPs will be contacted to determine the cultural significance of the find and have input into desired management measures;
- any new sites will be registered in the NES AH Database and the AHIMs database (refer Chapter 7); and
- any new sites will be added to the AHMP site inventory within one month of the find.

5.2 Management of new Aboriginal sites

Newly identified sites that are not at risk of impact (ie over 20 m from approved disturbance areas of the development footprint) will be avoided through passive protection (Section 4.2.3). Avoidable sites that are within 20 m of approved disturbance areas of the development footprint will be managed through active protection measures identified in this plan (refer Section 4.2.2). Note that avoidance of newly identified Aboriginal objects is always the preferred heritage outcome. Mitigation measures should only be employed when it can be reasonably demonstrated that avoidance is not feasible.

Table 5.1 sets out the measures that are proposed for newly identified Aboriginal sites. Heritage NSW must be notified and consulted about any plans to move, collect or salvage newly identified sites.

All proposed salvage measures must be completed by a qualified archaeologist(s) with participation of at least one RAP representative. All salvaged objects will be relocated to the nominated keeping place, if practical to do so (i.e. there is still sufficient capacity to accommodate new objects) and managed as per Section 4.2.4.

Where required, ACEN Australia will help facilitate any culturally appropriate reburial or ceremonial methods. Prepare report for Heritage NSW and RAPs on the outcome of relevant investigation, recovery and reburial outcomes. Update AHMP by adding the newly discovered burial site to Table A.1 and describing subsequent actions; and. Works will not recommence until written approval is received from relevant authorities.

Steps	Actions
	 If the Aboriginal ancestral remains can be avoided: develop appropriate management and mitigation measures in consultation with RAPs and archaeologists; prepare report for DPE, Heritage NSW and RAPs; update AHMP; and works will not recommence until written advice is provided from the project archaeologist that the remains are suitably protected and away from project impacts.

6 Ongoing operational and training protocols

6.1 Obligation to protect Aboriginal cultural heritage

6.1.1 Obligation to avoid harm

All employees, contractors, sub-contractors and visitors to the project have an obligation to avoid harming Aboriginal heritage unless engaged in an Aboriginal heritage management activity described in this plan.

The NPW Act defines "harm" to an object or place as any act or omission that:

- (a) destroys, defaces or damages the object or place, or
- (b) in relation to an object-moves the object from the land on which it had been situated, or
- (c) is specified by the regulations, or
- (d) causes or permits the object or place to be harmed in a manner referred to in paragraph (a), (b) or (c), but does not include any act or omission that:
- (e) desecrates the object or place, or
- (f) is trivial or negligible, or
- (g) is excluded from this definition by the regulations.

6.1.2 Obligation to protect and implement management measures

Site personnel, contractors and subcontractors responsible for land management or construction have an obligation to protect Aboriginal heritage within their area or work responsibility. Protection means active recognition of known Aboriginal heritage and active measures to avoid Aboriginal heritage. This may include fencing, erosion control and modification of work plans to avoid impacts to Aboriginal heritage, as well as facilitating a process where work personnel are aware of the nearby heritage.

Site personnel, contractors and subcontractors also have the responsibility to ensure that appropriate management measures have been employed prior to, or in association with, their activities which impact Aboriginal sites.

6.2 Aboriginal heritage induction

6.2.1 Site inductions

All employees, contractors, sub-contractors involved in ground-disturbing activities will undergo an Aboriginal cultural heritage induction conducted either by a representative of the RAP, the lead contractor (once appropriately trained to present the induction), or their subcontractor (once appropriately trained to present the induction). In addition, visitors to the project and general contractors not involved in ground-disturbing activities will be made aware of their obligation to avoid harm to Aboriginal heritage through an Aboriginal heritage component of the general site induction. Records of these inductions will be kept by ACEN Australia/its contractors.

The Aboriginal heritage induction / relevant sub-component of the site induction will be planned in consultation with RAPs. ACEN Australia will seek input from RAPs regarding appropriate materials for input and key issues that RAPs would like raised to all inductees. This may involve sending relevant draft material (such as induction booklets or slideshow slides) to RAPs for their review and comment within a reasonable timeframe (minimum one week).

The following points will be conveyed through site induction material:

- Aboriginal sites have been identified across the project boundary and beyond;
- Aboriginal sites are of high significance to the Aboriginal community, are important to the wider community and must be treated with respect;
- Aboriginal sites are protected by law and that project approval includes conditions allowing impacts to certain specified Aboriginal sites in accordance with this plan;
- Aboriginal sites have included grinding grooves, scarred trees, quarries, stone artefact sites;
- Aboriginal sites can be hard to recognise, therefore reference must be made to the Aboriginal heritage maps in this AHMP in order to clearly identify demarcated site boundaries;
- certain sites must be protected or salvaged by the project archaeologist and RAPs prior to ground disturbance activities; and
- that there are new finds procedures which involve stopping work if suspected new Aboriginal sites or skeletal material is identified on-site.

6.2.2 Fostering cultural heritage awareness

ACEN Australia will provide opportunities for RAP representatives to participate in activities related to training and fostering cultural heritage awareness in the project boundary. This will involve ACEN Australia exploring opportunities to involve RAPs in training the lead contractor and/or relevant subcontractors to give cultural heritage inductions, toolbox sessions during construction and operations (as may be relevant) and provide updates on Aboriginal heritage matters for the

project. ACEN Australia will also explore opportunities to work with suitable Aboriginal people to develop and implement Cultural Heritage Awareness Training for the life of the project.

June 2023 update:

ACEN Australia and RAPs have developed and implemented cultural toolbox sessions since December 2021 that are hosted by RAP representatives on a rotating roster. These toolbox sessions are generally undertaken on a monthly basis unless cancelled or postponed due to unforeseen circumstances.

A 'run sheet' for the toolbox sessions is attached to this AHMP as Appendix G.

6.3 Implementation of this plan

The individuals responsible for the implementation of the plan are provided in Table 6.1. The plan will be stored in ACEN Australia / its contractor's document control system; the latest version will be available electronically at all times. As the document owner, ACEN Australia is the contact point for this plan and its requirements and will provide guidance and training to any person that requires additional training regarding this plan.

6.4 Measuring performance

Actions undertaken under the plan will be reported as part of required Independent Environmental Audits to DPE. Compliance with the plan will be measured by standard environmental auditing procedures undertaken at regular intervals. The audit will include an assessment of compliance with development consent conditions and will include auditing the following measures:

- collection of all nominated sites;
- protection of all nominated sites;
- inductions are taking place and include appropriate material;
- a keeping place is suitably established and collected material is suitably stored and presented; and
- the NES AH Database is updated and maintained as required by this plan.

ACEN Australia may engage a heritage consultant to assist with reporting compliance as part of an Independent Environmental Audit. Any incidents and non-compliance notifications will follow requirements set out in Section 7.4 and Section 7.5 below.

Regular inspections of the fencing will be completed by the Stage 2a EPC Project Manager for Stage 2a areas and the Stage 1b Operations Manager for Stage 1b areas. These inspections are completed monthly or after periods of high wind and will monitor whether the protection mechanisms are intact and have not impacted Aboriginal objects.

September 2023 update:

ACEN Australia and RAP members have co-developed a cultural heritage sites management program, including development of condition assessment criteria to support ongoing monitoring of heritage sites. The condition assessment checklist template is included in Appendix F.

6.5 Ground disturbance proposed outside of development footprint

Ground disturbance proposed outside of the approved development footprint, or outside other existing approved areas under the development consent, will not occur without prior Aboriginal heritage assessment and other relevant legislative and internal approvals. Further, it is noted that

ACEN Australia has no rights outside of the development footprint given that it is not the owner of the land; its rights are limited to the boundary of the Leased areas and that any development or construction activities outside of the approved development footprint would require a modification of the DA.

Passive management will apply to items that have been identified for protection within the project boundary but over 50 m from the development footprint. While no fencing, signage or active land management measures are proposed for these sites, their locations will be kept on the NES AH Database for persons working on or visiting the project boundary.

Items within the passive protection zone will be clearly identified during the project induction and toolbox talks as project exclusion zones. No project activities can occur in these areas even though they are not visually identified – in these instances ACEN Australia has the obligation to advise relevant landholders about their responsibilities not to harm items on their property.

Depending on the scope, nature and approval pathway of the proposed ground disturbance, the following may apply:

- If the proposed activity requires additional environmental assessment, such as a modification to the existing development consent, an Aboriginal heritage assessment will be completed in accordance with relevant assessment requirements as specified by DPE.
- If the proposed activity is permissible under the existing SSD development consent (ie Aboriginal heritage impact permit (AHIP) not required), an Aboriginal heritage assessment must initially be completed to a level consistent with the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for* the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW 2010b). Any potential impacts to known or newly identified Aboriginal objects will be managed in accordance with the new finds procedures set out in Chapter 5.
- If the proposed activity requires a separate approval pathway not permissible as part of SSD under the EP&A Act, then an Aboriginal heritage assessment must initially be completed to a level consistent with the Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW 2010b). Depending on the outcomes of the due diligence assessment, further investigation may be required in accordance with the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in New South Wales (DECCW 2010c) and relevant subdocuments. If Aboriginal objects are likely to be impacted, an AHIP would need to be pursued under the NPW Act to allow harm to Aboriginal objects.

7 Reporting, review and data management

7.1 Statutory reporting requirements

Notifications to Heritage NSW are required in relation to discovery, impact and care of Aboriginal objects under the NPW Act. This will be the responsibility of ACEN Australia's HSE Manager with information received by relevant Contractors.

7.1.1 Discovery of Aboriginal objects

Under Section 89A of the NPW Act, it is a requirement that Heritage NSW is notified of the existence of Aboriginal objects as soon as practicable after they are first identified. This is done through the completion of the Heritage NSW Aboriginal Site Card which is submitted to the Registrar of AHIMS for inclusion on the Aboriginal site database. Information regarding AHIMS and site recording forms can be downloaded from Heritage NSW's website:

7.1.2 Care agreements

Under s85A of the NPW Act, Aboriginal objects remain the property, and under the protection of, the Crown until formal transfer to a person or persons of a class prescribed by the regulations occurs. A Care Agreement should be lodged with Heritage NSW for the recovered objects specified in this plan (Section 4.2.5).

7.1.3 Reporting impact to Aboriginal sites

An Aboriginal Site Impact Recording Form must be completed following impacts to AHIMS sites that are:

- a) a result of test excavation carried out in accordance with the Code of Practice for the Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in NSW;
- b) authorised by an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) issued by DPE;
- c) undertaken for the purpose of complying with Secretary's environmental assessment requirements issued by DPE for:
 - i) state significant development (SSD),
 - ii) state significant infrastructure (SSI), or
 - iii) a major project, or

d) authorised by a SSD/SSI/former Part 3A consent/approval under the EP&A Act.

7.2 AHMP review

7.2.1 Review cycle for this plan

This AHMP will be reviewed and, if necessary, revised to the satisfaction of the Secretary prior to carrying out works associated with any modification to the conditions of SSD-9255.

This AHMP will be reviewed following a discovery of heritage significance, any incident or independent audit where issues are found. Additional review is to occur when there is an audit conducted for the site.

7.2.2 Making changes to this plan

Changes to the plan will be made in the following circumstances:

- where approved modifications to the project introduce new impacts on Aboriginal heritage which are not generally covered by the AHMP;
- where approved changes to the project change or remove previously planned impacts on Aboriginal heritage where mitigation was proposed in the plan but is no longer required; and/or
- where other conditions or situations arise that require the updating of this plan.

It is noted that the AHMP may require modification to the project approval if not aligned with the current project conditions of approval. However, the document provides a framework for post-approval heritage management, and where issues are identified, the AHMP may require updating and/or modification. Where such updates are required, DPE will be consulted and a modification to approval would only be sought if deemed necessary by DPE. ACEN Australia will be guided by DPE whether the nature of any proposed changes require endorsement by Heritage NSW.

7.2.3 Aboriginal consultation for AHMP review

Where changes are made to the AHMP, a draft of the modified plan will be provided to RAPS for their review and comment (14 calendar day review period).

Matters raised during consultation which are specific to any proposed changes in the plan will be acknowledged and addressed in the modified plan. Further requirements for Aboriginal consultation are set out in Chapter 2.

7.3 New England Solar Aboriginal Heritage Database

The NES AH Database will be issued to and maintained by ACEN Australia. The database will be a 'live' document of the Aboriginal heritage resources within the project boundary that will be continuously updated to reflect new finds and the management status of all Aboriginal sites within the project boundary.

The database must include:

- a record of current management status, location and boundaries of Aboriginal sites, site areas and PAD boundaries; and
- a record of Aboriginal heritage survey coverage (represented by GPS survey tracks).

The database will comprise datasets available in both MS Excel format and Geographical Information System (GIS) Format. GIS data will be made available for mapping purposes to assist in the identification and management of Aboriginal heritage sites and areas during the life of the project. The database will be 'version controlled' to ensure that all relevant parties involved in Aboriginal heritage management are working with the most up to date datasets.

ACEN Australia/its contractors will be responsible for ensuring that all relevant employees, RAPs and subcontractors are provided with up to date datasets.

The database will be updated within 28 days in the following circumstances:

- discovery of a confirmed new Aboriginal site or human remains;
- changes or incidents to existing Aboriginal sites;
- changes to the management status of Aboriginal sites and areas; and/or
- the completion of Aboriginal heritage activities such as survey, excavation, surface collection, and protective measures.

Note that any newly identified Aboriginal object must be registered on AHIMS as specified in Section 7.1.1.

7.5 Notifiable Incidents

The Development Consent defines an incident as:

An occurrence or set of circumstances that causes or threatens to cause material harm.

The Development Consent defines material harm as harm that:

- involves actual or potential harm to the health or safety of human beings or to ecosystems that is not trivial; or
- results in actual or potential loss of property damage of an amount, or amounts in aggregate, exceeding \$10,000 (such loss includes the reasonable costs and expenses that would be incurred in taking all reasonable and practicable measures to prevent, mitigate or make good harm to the environment).

This definition of 'material harm' is consistent with the definition in Section 147 of the *Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997* and the associated legal obligations to notify the EPA where a 'pollution' incident occurs such that material harm to the environment is caused or threatened.

In the context of aboriginal heritage management, a notifiable incident is:

Unauthorised ground disturbance within Aboriginal site or PAD boundaries identified in this ACHMP that are scheduled for active or passive avoidance as per Table A.1.

7.5.1 Immediate Response

Any incident that occurs that causes or threatens to cause material harm will be reported immediately to ACEN Australia's Project Manager (during construction and operations).

Upon receiving notification of an incident, ACEN Australia's Project Manager (or their nominee if offsite at the time of the incident) will immediately attend the incident and:

- Isolate the area affected by the incident
- Stop works around the area
- Implement containment measures to prevent the impact of the incident spreading
- Decide as to whether the incident has caused or threatens to cause material harm.

7.5.2 External Notifications

7.5.2.1 Duty to Report

If ACEN Australia's Project Manager (or their nominee if off-site at the time of the incident) has determined the incident has caused or threatens to cause material harm, he/she will, pursuant to requirements under Section 148 of the *Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997* immediately notify the EPA, the NSW Ministry of Health, Fire and Rescue NSW and SafeWork NSW by verbal means.

These authorities will be notified (verbally) and provided the following relevant information:

- The time, date, nature, duration and location of the incident
- The location of the place where pollution is occurring or is likely to occur
- The nature, the estimated quantity or volume and the concentration of any pollutants involved, if known
- The circumstances in which the incident occurred (including the cause of the incident, if known)
- The action taken or proposed to be taken to deal with the incident and any resulting pollution or threatened pollution, if known.

The EPA may direct ACEN Australia to notify such other persons of the incident as the EPA requires.

7.5.2.2 Notifications

All agencies including DPE will be notified immediately after becoming aware of an incident. Consistent with Schedule 4 Condition 7 of the Development Consent, notification to DPE will be in writing via the Major Projects website portal, including the following information:

- Identify the development (i.e. the NES) and the application number (SSD 9255)
- Set out the location and nature of the incident.

Seven days after the incident, ACEN Australia will prepare a report as per Appendix 7 of the Development Consent.

7.6 Non-Compliance

7.6.1 Commitment

A failure to comply with a Condition of Development Consent or statutory approval will constitute a non-compliance.

7.6.2 Response

In the event of a non-compliance, ACEN Australia and its contractor (where relevant) will undertake the five steps as outlined within Table 7.1 below, consistent with the guidance advice for ISO 14001 – Environmental management systems.

	3. Determining if similar non-compliances exist or could potentially occur.
Act	Implement any action required.
Review	Review the effectiveness of any corrective action taken.
Change	Make changes to the environmental management plans, if necessary.

7.6.3 Corrective Action

Any non-compliance will trigger a Corrective Action appropriate to the significance of the effect of the non-compliance. ACEN Australia and its Contractor (where relevant) will retain documented information as evidence of the nature of the non-compliance and any subsequent actions taken, and the results of the Corrective Action.

7.6.4 Notification

Consistent with Schedule 4 Conditions 8-10 of the Development Consent, DPE will be notified in writing via the Major Projects website portal within seven days after ACEN Australia and its Contractor becomes aware of any non-compliance. A non-compliance which has been notified as an incident does not need to also be notified as a non-compliance.

The notification will:

- Identify the development (i.e. as NES) and the application number (SSD 9255)
- Set out the Condition/s of Development Consent that the NES is non-compliant with
- The way in which it does not comply
- The reasons for non-compliance (if known)
- What actions have been done, or will be, undertaken to address the non-compliance.

1 Introduction

Thank you for your continued involvement in Aboriginal cultural heritage matters for the New England Solar Farm (the project) at Uralla NSW. This letter is to advise your party that EMM Consulting Pty Limited (EMM) has been engaged on behalf of the proponent UPC Renewables Australia Pty Limited (UPC) to prepare an Aboriginal heritage management plan (AHMP) for the project.

The project is classed as a State Significant Development (SSD) under the State Environmental Planning Policy (State and Regional Development) 2011 (SRD SEPP). A development application (DA) and environmental impact statement (EIS) was submitted under Part 4, Division 4.1 of the NSW *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* (EP&A Act). Project approval is anticipated in March 2020 and we are initiating the Aboriginal consultation early.

As part of the EIS, EMM prepared an Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment report (ACHAR) for the project, inclusive of an addendum report issued after the public exhibition phase in early 2019. The ACHAR included an Aboriginal heritage impact assessment and outlined management measures that are required to be detailed in an AHMP.

The primary aims of this letter is to notify your party that the AHMP is being prepared and to gather upfront input and feedback about the management commitments outlined in the project ACHAR. Further comments and feedback will be sought once the draft AHMP is prepared and issued to all registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs), and during a proposed consultation meeting in Armidale planned for March 2020 (date to be advised).

2 Scope of AHMP

An AHMP will be prepared based on the management recommendations set out in the ACHAR. The AHMP will involve the following main tasks:

- Consultation with the DPIE Biodiversity and Conservation Division (BCD) regional archaeologist (Roger Mehr) and RAPs about the details of the AHMP;
- Preparation of a draft AHMP for RAP review, which will provide details of;
 - all Aboriginal sites identified during the archaeological investigation for the project;
 - management measures and their progress towards completion;
 - measures to ensure ongoing consultation and involvement of project RAPs;

- RAP access arrangements for a selection of significant sites for educational purposes;
- protocols for newly identified sites;
- protocols for educating staff and contractors of their obligations relating to Aboriginal cultural heritage values through a site induction process;
- protocols for suspected human skeletal materials;
- protocols for the ongoing care of salvaged Aboriginal objects within a keeping place; and
- provisions for review and updates of the AHMP;
- preparation of a revised AHMP incorporating the outcomes of RAP consultation;
- preparation of a final draft for BCD and Uralla Shire Council (Council) review and comment; and
- preparation of the final AHMP, based on RAP, Council and BCD review, for issue to, and to be endorsed by, the Secretary of DPIE.

3 Key matters to be addressed in the AHMP

Important matters requiring RAP feedback include:

- 1. The methods and materials for site avoidance and conservation (including stone artefact sites, grinding grooves and scar trees).
- 2. Management of significant grinding groove sites NE09 and NE68, including fencing and long-term cultural/educational access and maintenance by RAPs.
- 3. The methods and procedures for conducting surface salvage of Aboriginal objects within the project impact area, including the collection of 26 isolated artefacts and six artefact scatters.
- 4. The methods for the salvage, curation and presentation of the felled and sawn in half scar tree NE49.
- 5. The details of the proposed Aboriginal keeping place at the Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place (96-104 Kentucky Street, Armidale NSW), McCrossins Mill Museum, and/or the Uralla Visitor Information Centre.

EMM will proceed to draft the first version of the AHMP and will incorporate best practice archaeological measures and methods into the document for RAP consideration. However, we will be seeking feedback from RAPs throughout the process (in writing and during the proposed consultation meeting) so that the final AHMP considers the views and input of RAPs. We welcome any feedback upfront about the items listed above.

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4 Next steps

EMM will proceed to draft the AHMP which will be issued to RAPs within the next month. RAPs will be provided with 28 days to review the AHMP and provide written feedback. During the RAP review period, we plan to hold a meeting with UPC, EMM and RAPs in Armidale to workshop the details of the proposed management measures.

My Elders only spoke of Gumbangirr when speaking of the Nimborder area and Dhunghutti when speaking of Kunderang Camp Site and so because of this I have not included them..

I am convinced that the survey area is the Ooralla in which over many hundreds of years, meetings and gathering were held at this location in restrengthening ties, exchanging news and to trade. This is supported by the nearby town of Uralla which is the English spelling of Ooralla. The UNE also have a centre with the title of Ooralla (meaning meeting place). And this is where my concern lies, in that the report does not have any mention of this non-tangible aspect, which to me is just as important as the tangible aspects. And if the Ooralla is not mentioned in the report in the context I have written about then, personally the report will fail my people greatly in that another part of our oral culture will have disappeared like much culture previously.

As such, I strongly urge yourself (Ryan) and the other RAP's to, while supporting or not supporting the report as is, to request that the report take into consideration the non-tangible aspects which even though cannot be measured from a scientific perspective, should be inclusive from a traditional oral Aboriginal historical perspective of teaching and passing on culture through the process of story telling, dance and such gathering as with Ooralla site. It has just as much historical importance to me as an Aboriginal Cultural Knowldge Holder as do the artefacts found at this location.

I would like to remind everyone that the 14-day response timeframe for the AHMP updates as specified in the email below will be coming to a close tomorrow on 30 March 2021. I have discussed the content with all those available via telephone during other discussions about the scar tree NE49 at the keeping place.

Presently I have not yet received any formal responses or alternative proposed methods to that provided in the AHMP. Of primary interest, the proposed additional surface collection methods shown in 4.3.1 (ii) (a) provides a table with site condition and management summaries for each site. EMM has presented our recommendations on the feasibility of the sites being salvaged from an archaeological perspective. Sites highlighted orange in the table indicate where EMM considers collection could be potentially successful with additional measures. Sites highlighted red in the table indicate where EMM considers that further collection attempts would be unsuccessful, and therefore no further collection or mitigation is recommended. Finally, site NE13 is outside of the proposed disturbance footprint and is highlighted green as it will not be disturbed and will not require further management. As such, if no alternatives are offered, the updated AHMP will be submitted as per the recommendations set out in the draft plan.

Upon careful consideration of the nature of the sites (the characteristics of the artefacts and the current condition of the sites) and their archaeological significance, we propose that additional vegetation clearance and raking is a better suited option in the attempt to re-identify and collect the outstanding sites. These sites typically feature very small artefacts in small frequencies (18 isolated artefacts and the remaining are small artefact scatters (between 2 and 7 artefacts)). We acknowledge that vegetation clearance and raking may not be successful, but propose that alternative measures would have equal, if not lesser, success and with greater hazard risks and ground disturbance.

Construction ground disturbance monitoring, or monitoring controlled grader scrapes prior to construction, can sometimes be employed to monitor for previously un-recorded sub-surface artefact material. However, we propose that such methods are not appropriate for the following reasons:

- As the artefacts were previously identified on the surface, grader scrapes or other machine excavation likely gather the artefacts in the resulting mounded soil, thus obscuring the ground surface, displacing the artefacts, and reducing the chance of re-identifying the artefacts.
- The artefacts are typically isolated finds or small artefact scatters. Their generally small size would make it very difficult for identification during ground disturbance activities.
- There are also project-related risks of having non-construction team personnel on site during the construction phase. There is increased hazard risks of having people monitoring on site next to heavy machinery.
- Employing grader scrapes over sites may result in greater ground disturbance than actual project-related ground disturbance. Broader scale grader scrapes over some of the site areas (eg NE15 which had a sparsely scattered 7 artefacts over an approx. 200 m by 100 m area) would constitute a far greater net surface disturbance than originally planned. UPC are working under a principle to employ as little ground disturbance as possible.

We believe that the proposed method of vegetation removal and raking is better suited for the following reasons:

- It will provide RAPs with another attempt to identify and collect artefacts that are culturally important to the Aboriginal community;
- It will attempt to return the ground surface to a similar 'bare-surface' condition to when the sites were originally identified; and
- It will result in as minimum ground disturbance as possible to the sites.

Unfortunately, we are often faced with this issue in post-approval surface collection for projects across NSW. Overall, we would like to remind that one of the key reasons of salvage collection is to gather a representative sample of artefacts within a project area for analysis, reporting, safekeeping and display. It is commonly acknowledged that not every stone artefact in a project area can be identified and collected. One of the ways UPC has offered to offset this issue has been to update the management plan permit the collection all re-identifiable Aboriginal stone axes in the project area for display at the keeping centre. This decision has been made in consultation with the Aboriginal community as particular significance has been placed on these items. As such, as per the updated AHMP, once a further attempt of salvage collection has been made for the nominated 23 sites, there will be no further attempts to identify and collect those artefacts. Notwithstanding, any artefact identified during the life of the project will be subject to the unexpected finds protocol as per chapter 5 of the AHMP.



Dear Registered Party,

EMM on behalf of UPC/AC Renewables would like to advise your party that UPC/AC Renewables intends to submit the updated New England Solar Farm Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Management Plan (AHMP) to the Department of Planning Industry and Environment (DPIE) for approval. This follows the issue of the draft updated AHMP to all parties on 16 March 2021, followed by requests for feedback via phone the following week. In summary, the updated AHMP included changes under the following sections:

- Section 4.2.2 (ii) Barriers.
- Section 4.3.1 (ii) Additional requirements for unsuccessful site collection attempts. Note that this section contained a draft table that provided site condition details for each site.
 EMM presented recommendations on the feasibility of the sites being salvaged from an archaeological perspective. Sites highlighted orange in the table indicated where EMM considered collection could be potentially successful with additional measures. Sites highlighted red in the table indicated where EMM considered that further collection attempts would be unsuccessful, and therefore no further collection or mitigation was recommended. Despite this initial recommendation, UPC/AC Renewables has resolved to attempt to all these orange and red highlighted sites regardless of the prior recommendation. This is proposed to demonstrate that UPC are committed to giving all outstanding sites appropriate attempts at resolving their management.

Finally, site NE13 is outside of the proposed disturbance footprint and is highlighted green as it will not be disturbed and will not require further management.

- The table also included the recommendation to allow unmitigated impacts to scar tree NE67 which
 was observed during fieldwork to have collapsed. RAPs considered the tree to be in a condition
 beyond salvage and did not nominate to salvage the tree. This recommendation has been included
 in the updated AHMP.
- Section 4.3.1 (iii) Additional collection for Aboriginal stone hatchets.

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Re: New England Solar Farm: Further details on the management of Aboriginal Scar Tree NE49

Dear Registered Party,

Thank you for your continued participation in Aboriginal cultural heritage matters for the New England Solar Farm project. This letter provides detail on the proposed preservation and display of Aboriginal scar tree NE49 for your input and/or comment. Scar tree NE49 was salvaged and relocated to the Armidale Cultural Centre and Keeping Place (ACCKP) on 8 January 2021 in accordance with Section 4.3.2 of the project Aboriginal Heritage Management Plan (AHMP). The fieldwork was completed by EMM Archaeologist Ryan Desic, NESF RAPs Steven Ahoy, Colin Ahoy and Cheryl Kitchener, and arborists Bells Tree Service. The tree is currently stored temporarily at the ACCKP in a holding room awaiting arrangements for its display.

EMM on behalf of UPC/AC Renewables (UPC) has recently discussed tree preservation and display options with the ACCKP and Registered Aboriginal Party Steven Ahoy. There are two key actions required to progress the AHMP commitments for tree display and signage:

- ACCKP has advised that the current size of the tree portion is too large in height and weight to display appropriately at the centre. As such, it requires a reduction in size to fit within a movable display case.
- Insects, including termites, within the tree must be eliminated prior to display. As the tree was already dead and decaying in the field, it is probable that insects observed recently by the ACCKP have been transported with the tree. The ACCKP have raised this as an issue requiring immediate attention so as not to compromise other parts of the collection.

UPC propose the following method which is in accordance with Section 4.3.2 of the project AHMP:

- To reduce the current size of the tree, an Arborist will be engaged to shorten the tree to a suitable length that preserves the tree scar and does not compromise the structural integrity of the tree. The ACCKP raised the possibility of cutting the tree vertically and retain the scar in a semi-cylinder trunk form; however, this would not comply with the current AHMP provisions and therefore is unlikely to be permitted unless the AHMP is changed. Furthermore, there is a farmer-made notched square in the side of the tree that would be lost by vertical cut method, but RAP Colin Ahoy has requested for it to be retained as it demonstrates why the tree was originally felled.
- An indicative proposed cut line is shown in Plate 1 below. It is estimated that the tree length would be 1.2-1.5 m after further cutting.




Plate 1 Indicative tree cut line and notched portion that requires to be retained.

- After the tree is cut to size, the overhanging portion will be removed and discarded. The section with the scar will be taken outside and further cleaned to remove as much decayed wood as possible from the inside of the trunk. This may involve using hand tools and power tools to an arborists discretion to effectively remove insects and their habitat from the centre of the tree. Once the tree is suitably cleaned it will be placed in a dry and secure location to aerate. This temporary location may either be at the keeping place or at the pest control specialist's workshop, in preparation for insect treatment.
- A pest control specialist will be engaged to treat the tree once suitably dry. After application, the tree
 may be covered for a period to ensure treatment absorption. The scar tree will be returned to the
 keeping place after treatment.

The tree cutting and cleaning procedure will be overseen by an EMM archaeologist, a RAP representative, and a representative of the ACCKP.

After the tree is treated, a contractor will be engaged to build a display case to accommodate the tree. The display case will be transparent to allow appropriate viewing and security for the tree. The display will also include signage containing details of the tree and its provenance. The ACCKP will be further consulted for UPC to provide a suitable display case.

Please provide feedback to the proposed methods as soon as possible to allow the ACCKP to progress with the required treatment and display of the tree. If you have any questions about the proposed methods feel free to contact me via email or telephone.



Good Morning Steven and Rose,

I have contacted the Australian Museum, Indigenous Team for advice on the treatment of the Scar Tree. I spoke to Logan Metcalfe, Acting Manager, Indigenous Team.

Logan's team do not work on the conservation of cultural materials but have suggested you speak with Colin McGegor who is an expert in this form of conservation. Colin is currently retired but Logan is suggesting that Colin would be happy to assist. Colin's contact number is 0405737437.

In the initial stages of conservation for scar tree, Logan has suggested:

- 1, The carpet surrounding the Scar tree is to be removed as soon as possible as the carpet would be a breeding ground for termites, beetles, insects etc.
- 2. Cut tree to the required size before treating
- 3.Brush tree carefully to remove outstanding soil, dead insects etc
- 4. Ensure tree is completely secure and bound to avoid further splitting
- 5. Cover the tree completely with thick black plastic, making sure the tree is airtight

There are two ways to treat the tree:

- 1. Freeze tree in a large freezer for a week. UPC would need to hire a cold storage freezer for a week.
- 2. Pest Control: UPC would have to hire a Pest Controller to get rid of termites, borers, beetles etc

Dear Registered Party,

Further management of scar tree NE49 was completed successfully on Wednesday 31 March 2021. Arborists CJW Tree Services, Steve Ahoy (Iwatta Corp) and representatives of the keeping place attended, including Adam Spencer and director Rose Lovelock. The tree was cut to approximately 1 m in length and then thoroughly cleaned and placed under a covered area at the Keeping Place to dry prior to pest control treatment. It is noted that the tree is in a fragile condition and has been re-strapped around the girth of the for additional support. EMM recommends that the strapping is left on the tree while it is being moved and mounted in its display case in the future. The strapping should only be removed once the tree is positioned and secured well in its display case.

The temporary storage area under an outdoor covered area was nominated by Keeping Place staff Adam Spencer and RAP Steve Ahoy who confirmed that the area is a suitable temporary space that will be monitored regularly. It is anticipated that the tree will require up to 2 weeks to dry prior to pest control treatment.

In the meantime, Steve Ahoy is arranging for a local cabinet maker to measure the tree to construct a suitable display case. Photographs of the proceedings are shown below.

On behalf of UPC/AC Renewables and EMM, thank you for your continued participation in ongoing consultation as registered Aboriginal parties (RAPs) for the New England Solar Farm (NESF) project. 1 Introduction

The following letter presents the outcomes of discussion between UPC/AC Renewables, Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs), EMM Consulting and Green Light Contractors about fostering cultural awareness and site inductions for the New England Solar Farm (NESF) project. A meeting was held online via Microsoft Teams on 7 October 2021, after a letter invite on 28 September 2021 inviting all RAPs to participate in the discussion. The aims of the discussion were to:

- Notify RAPs that UPC/AC intends to have Aboriginal community involvement in providing culturally appropriate training to NESF site personnel;
- Establish the key messages and information RAPs would like to convey to site personnel during training and information sessions; and
- The people, materials and teaching aids that should be involved for the training and information.

The topics discussed are presented in the attached discussion slides, and areas of key discussion points are presented in Table 2. With key input by LA, it was determined that the toolbox sessions need to address two main aspects: the first being a presentation of the Aboriginal history and cultural significance of the land on which the project is being developed; the second being a practical aspect where teaching aids are used by RAPs to teach site personnel about what types of Aboriginal archaeological sites occur throughout the landscape and how to identify Aboriginal objects in the instance of unexpected finds. LA agreed that examples of Aboriginal sites, such as stone artefacts should be used to assist the RAPs to present the toolbox session material. These can be sourced from the materials salvaged for the NESF project. 	
Other business	LA noted the on-going importance for local RAPs to be able to access the identified culturally significant sites such that they can re-assure the local community of their condition. TG and RD noted that the sites were all fenced and that weed management around the sites would likely need to occur on a regular basis. This may create a regular opportunity for the sites to be visited by RAP representatives. This was recognised as likely to occur during project operation of the rather than during project construction (access during Construction likely to be affected by WH&S). LA noted that he would like to see a process in place by which RAP reps can 'verify' access requests to heritage sites before they are approved by UPC.	UPC/AC will explore the best options to combine site condition monitoring with weed management tasks for fenced Aboriginal sites. This is likely to involve RAP representative participation in the weed management fieldwork tasks. UPC\AC to review current access protocols with RAPs, and confirm it is reflective of all RAP aspirations. Any amendments to protocols to be made in agreement with RAPs.	

5 Draft proposed toolbox session

Table 3 provides a draft of the proposed toolbox session that will be developed, implemented and reviewed as the Project progresses. RAP review and feedback is requested prior to initial implementation. UPC/AC require RAPs to nominate themselves or others that they believe should be involved in the toolbox sessions, particular to any new persons to site. Note that UPC/AC will negotiate payment and commercial arrangement of RAP representative involvement prior to the implementation of this plan.





"An oral history based on Aboriginal knowledge holder information about Ooralla will be recorded and stored at the Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place. This will involve interviewing interested and willing RAP knowledge holders (such as Les Ahoy from Nganyawana Clan Group) via audio and/or video mediums. The content of oral histories would be at the direction and discretion of knowledge holders. All documented material will be stored on archival quality digital mediums and stored at the nominated keeping place in association will salvaged archaeological material. UPC are exploring the best approach to gathering this information, but at present a draft idea is a two-stage approach whereby:

- An anthropologist experienced in recording oral histories is to undertake interviews with knowledge holders

1.0 Introduction

Thank you for your continued involvement in Aboriginal cultural heritage management for the New England Solar Farm Project (the project). This letter is to advise your party of the following items:

- 1. Updates to the structure and payment provisions of the Cultural Awareness Toolbox Sessions, and
- 2. Upcoming fieldwork for surface collection and fencing boundary demarcation of sites with the project Stage 2 area. **Proposed dates: 10–13 October 2022.**

Item 1: Updates to structure and payment provisions of the Cultural Awareness Toolbox Sessions

ACEN has been in the process of reviewing the project Cultural Awareness Toolbox Sessions based on feedback provided by Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs). ACEN value these sessions and appreciate the contribution RAPs have made to their success in fostering cultural awareness for all personnel involved in the project. Proposed changes to the session structure and fees are proposed to reflect:

- Acknowledgment of the skills and experience required for individuals to successfully deliver the content of the toolbox sessions to large audiences
- To encourage RAP participation in ongoing sessions by making the sessions fair and equitable, and
- To acknowledge that the skills and experience involved in the delivery of the toolbox sessions are separate to that of fieldwork and payment should be structured accordingly.

The proposed terms and conditions of the toolbox session are as follows:

1. The RAPs listed in Table 1 have previously been involved in delivering the toolbox sessions and will continue to be given the opportunity to deliver the sessions.

Each toolbox session, held at monthly intervals (where possible), will be allocated to **one** RAP group on a rostered basis. The rostered RAP will nominate a person to lead the toolbox session and may have an assistant if needed. A fee of up to \$875 (excluding GST) will be available for the rostered RAP group. If only the lead person partakes in the session, the fee available will be \$700, and if a support is used the fee will be \$875.

- 2. It is acknowledged that not all the RAP groups may be willing to deliver the toolbox sessions without experienced assistance. As such, rostered RAPs would be able to arrange help from other RAP members if necessary. Note that the total fee would remain at \$875 and any division of those fees amongst the participating people would be at their own discretion.
- 3. The \$875 fee mentioned above does not account for expenses incurred for RAPs that do not live locally (eg accommodation and travel). RAPs may contact ACEN to discuss reimbursement for expenses separately.
- 4. RAPs responsible for their rostered session will be required to advise ACEN of the nominated persons prior to each session.
- 5. If RAPs are not available for their rostered session, it will be offered to other RAPs in an equitable manner.

Item 2: Stage 2 surface collection works

ACEN plan to proceed with Aboriginal site management tasks associated with the Stage 2 portion of the approved project area. In accordance with the project Aboriginal heritage management plan (AHMP), this will require fieldwork tasks comprising: marking site boundaries for fencing and avoidance, and surface collection of artefacts from relevant Aboriginal sites within the Stage 2 project footprint.

We propose to undertake this fieldwork from Monday to Thursday **10–13 October 2022**. Fieldwork arrangements will involve Umwelt archaeologists and three RAP representatives each day according to existing roster arrangements. The terms of payment will be \$900 per RAP (excluding GST) per day for each rostered day. As the exact required duration of fieldwork is difficult to determine, we will advise RAPs during fieldwork if Friday 14 October will be required to complete the fieldwork scope as continue the roster accordingly. The roster is provided in Table 3.

One invoice should be issued for all of an organisation's involvement. Invoices must be made out to ACEN Australia. Payment will be made following receipt of a tax invoice from your party. Payment will not be made separately to individual organisation members. Appropriate insurance coverage (workers compensation, public liability insurance) must be provided by all applicants.

Dear Registered Party,

Last week we undertook Aboriginal site management fieldwork for the Stage 2 area of the New England Solar Farm. During the course of the fieldwork, the team observed that a number of scarred trees have deteriorated quickly and have fallen over or deteriorated beyond preservation. This is likely the result of frequent wet weather that has destabilised soils and accelerated rot of the dead tree root systems. In response, ACEN will act in accordance with the Aboriginal Heritage Management Plan (AHMP), which is highlighted in the excerpt below:

Provisions for protected Aboriginal scar trees

The 12 identified standing Aboriginal scar trees within the project boundary will be avoided through stake and wire active protection measures. Additional management is required to address their long-term management given that all examples are dead trees and most are in a highly deteriorated condition. The following long-term measures will be undertaken:

- after active protection measures are implemented the trees will be left in-situ to weather naturally.
- The trees will be inspected at five-year intervals to assess the trees' condition. The inspection will identify
 any structural and material issues with the trees. Alternatively, if structural or material issues are observed
 outside of these monitoring timeframes, RAPs and an archaeologist will be notified to determine if the step
 listed below is warranted.
- If through natural events or other unforeseen circumstances, the tree(s) break, fall or deteriorate beyond preservation, the tree(s) will be offered to the Aboriginal community (RAPs) for salvage and relocation to the Aboriginal keeping place as specified in Section 4.2.4. RAPs may decline the offer to salvage the tree(s) depending on the condition of the tree. If salvage is possible and desired by RAPs, salvage will involve sawing the tree at a suitable buffer above and below the scar(s) and extracting the scarred section. Any salvaged trees to be kept in the keeping place will be subject to the same provisions as specified for Aboriginal tree NE49.
- The duration of ACEN Australia's management commitments for the trees will be limited to the life of the project's operation.

The trees in question are provided in the table below.

Outcomes

From the information provided above, I consider that only site NE102 has a reasonable chance of salvage if it is also desired by RAPs. NE23 has some features of the scar intact, but the condition of the bark and tree trunk is probably too deteriorated by rot and termite damage to be reasonably salvage. NE25 is unrecognisable as a scar feature. Notwithstanding, ACEN would salvage NE23 and NE25 in accordance with the AHMP if RAPs request it.

Site NE102 will be visited during the next monthly toolbox session which will provide more clarity about its condition and whether salvage is a suitable option.

Additionally, ACEN has committed to conducting monthly status checks on trees within the Stage 1 area with the aim to proactively manage any further issues with the scarred trees and their management.

Please get back to me as soon as possible if you have any comments about the management of the trees discussed above.

3 **Contracting and employment**

- a. Iwatta Aboriginal Corporation commented that it has invested a lot of time, effort and money into building up its capability to tender for and deliver the current grounds maintenance contracts. Believes it should be up to each individual business to ensure their people are capable to undertake the works. Commented that the work Iwatta have been doing at the Grinding Groove site has been substantial as there has been so much moving and slashing to be done.
- b. ACEN sought interest from RAPs on the option of ACEN providing grounds maintenance equipment that could be available for shared use by RAPs to undertake a rotating roster of services
- c. Iwatta Aboriginal Corporation expressed disappointment in this offer from ACEN. Commented that they originally requested this of ACEN but were declined. Iwatta have now heavily invested in purchasing the equipment so would be seeking reimbursement from ACEN if this model was to be undertaken
- d. Iwatta Aboriginal Corporation commented that they don't currently have the capability to undertake fencing activities
- e. Nunawanna Aboriginal Corporation commented that they may have capability to undertake fencing activities and are also interested in site maintenance
- f. ACEN advised that there may be fencing contracting opportunities as part of the project
 - ACTION: Once information is available, on any possible fencing contacting opportunities, ACEN to provide to RAPs
- g. RAPs commented that rotating three month contracting periods are not long enough. While a roster period offers the benefit of sharing the work around, it does not provide people with job security
- h. Iwatta Aboriginal Corporation and Nunawanna Aboriginal Corporation indicated that two work teams of four people each could work well
- Culturally Aware Aboriginal Heritage Consultancy and Nganyawana Clan Group commented that the RAPs have been supporting the project since the beginning but ACEN now needs to come to the party. Commented that it's now time to get professional and put in place a commitment to long term contracting and employment for the life of the project.

ACTION: ACEN to propose agreement commitments for RAPs to consider and schedule follow up meeting with RAPs to discuss and refine. Draft agreement to present options for RAP review that take into consideration an approach that is:

- Fair and equitable amongst RAPs
- Provides opportunity for stable employment for members of the local Aboriginal community

Thank you for your continued involvement in Aboriginal cultural heritage matters for New England Solar.

I write to you to inform you that the Aboriginal Heritage Management Plan (AHMP) is undergoing revision and updates in response to <u>Modification 2</u> approval granted by the NSW Government in May 2023.

Additionally, with Stage 1 construction of New England Solar almost complete, ACEN Australia is now making preparations to commence Stage 2 construction activities. This has provided ACEN Australia with the opportunity to update the Aboriginal site inventory and relevant sections in the AHMP to account for the salvage and management measures completed to date. For clarity however, the existing approved AHMP encompasses Stage 1 and Stage 2 activities, the AHMP is merely being updated to reflect the current status of the project.

The AHMP has been actively implemented over the past two years while Stage 1 of New England Solar has been in construction, and I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the work achieved by all parties during this period to protect and manage the cultural heritage within the project area in accordance with the AHMP. I believe the partnership approach between ACEN and RAP members demonstrates how an AHMP can meaningfully be implemented and embedded into long term business activities.

In accordance with the AHMP, RAPs are invited to review and comment on the proposed updated sections of the AHMP. For transparency, and to guide you as to where updates have been made, we have included a draft version of the AHMP with tracked changes. We have also provided a clean version. We would appreciate any **comments or feedback in writing by 28 September 2023**, which is the minimum 14 days from issue in accordance with the AHMP. Written comments and feedback are the preferred option for the purposes of documenting consultation and giving us the opportunity to respond appropriately. We acknowledge however that all Aboriginal sites are of value and significance to the Aboriginal community and would like for the community's cultural significance to be acknowledged in the AHMP through the inclusion of an additional column. As such, please refer to Table A.1 Aboriginal Site Inventory, column titled 'Community cultural significance' in the enclosed updated draft AHMP where your party is welcome to comment on the cultural significance of each site. We can also discuss this matter at the next virtual meeting proposed for **Tuesday 19 September 2023 at 5.00pm**. Furthermore, we invite RAPs to provide any further statements of cultural significance that should be acknowledged upfront in the AHMP (such as in the title page sections).

New England Solar Stage 2

Request by RAPs that the New England Solar Stage 2 area be resurveyed. ACEN does not consider this necessary. The Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report (ACHAR) completed in 2018 and subsequent AHMP developed in 2021 (and updated in 2022) are inclusive of New England Stage 2 and were undertaken with active participation by RAPs. Additionally, we believe the implementation of management processes during New England Solar Stage 1 construction to avoid or protect identified sites, and to manage the identification of unanticipated finds was suitable. This approach would be applied for Stage 2.

We do however acknowledge that it may have been some time since RAPs have visited a number of the Stage 2 heritage sites, particularly those identified in the AHMP as requiring passive or active management. As such, we invite senior RAP representatives to New England Solar to view these sites on **Thursday 21 September 2023 at 2.00pm**. Please RSVP by Friday 15 September 2023.

Use of registered Archaeologist

Request for ACEN to consider engaging a new or alternative registered consulting archaeologist for future New England Solar AHMP activities. ACEN has considered this and believes the current approach remains suitable. Given that the existing approved AHMP includes Stage 2 activities, we don't foresee a significant amount of additional archeological works required into the future. Thank you for your request, uploaded to the Major Projects portal on 1 October 2020, about the draft Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Management Plan (ACHMP) for the New England Solar Farm development in the Uralla Shire local government area seeking comments from the Department of Premier and Cabinet, Heritage NSW (DPC). I appreciate the opportunity to provide input and apologise for the delay in responding.

We have reviewed the draft ACHMP and can provide in principle support however we note some areas where changes will be necessary before we can provide full endorsement.

We note a number of references to "BCD" within the document. Although many of these refer to historical events and should therefore remain, any references to relevant ongoing, or future, activities must be amended to refer to 'Heritage NSW'.

Section 2.4.1 of the draft ACHMP outlines some instances, including proposed changes to the ACHMP, where consultation with the project RAPs will be required. This section should be revised to include Heritage NSW in the consultation process for the instances referred to in that section. We also note references throughout the ACHMP to possible future changes to the ACHMP. Although we recognise that in some, very rare instances, changes to the ACHMP may be warranted we take this opportunity to note the following.

- The ACHMP is a binding document directly referred to by certain conditions of approval for the project thus any changes to the ACHMP after its ratification would require a modification to the project approval.
- Any proposed changes to the ACHMP after its ratification must be endorsed by Heritage NSW prior to being finalized.

Section 5 of the draft ACHMP outlines chance finds procedures to be followed for previously unknown Aboriginal objects or human remains are located during works. We note that these measures include; conservation *in-situ*, movement, test excavation and/or salvage. We further note that these various options for management are provided for all chance finds including ancestral human remains, grinding grooves, culturally modified trees, intact hearths and other site types. We also note that, apart from in the case of human remains, no provision for, or requirement of, notification to Heritage NSW is included in the protocols and measures outlined in the draft ACHMP. We require that this section is amended to ensure that Heritage NSW are

notified of all new Aboriginal and/or human remains discovered during the works. We furthermore require that any management measures (e.g. movement, collection or salvage), apart from conservation *in-situ*, must be endorsed by Heritage NSW prior to their being carried out. We furthermore take this opportunity to advise that Heritage NSW are extremely unlikely to endorse the harm, salvage or movement of ancestral human remains, grinding grooves or culturally modified trees as part of the construction, or ongoing life, of this project.

Section 6.2 of the draft ACHMP concerns Aboriginal Cultural Heritage site inductions. We note that facility is provided in the draft for site inductions to be done by non-Aboriginal people. We strongly recommend that a representative of the RAPs is present for all ACH site inductions.

BACKGROUND

- A. On 30 May 2022 an application was made to the Secretary of the Department of Planning and Environment for the transfer and safekeeping of Aboriginal objects pursuant to s.85A(1)(c) of the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974.
- **B.** UPC Renewables Australia Pty Ltd (UPC) proposes to develop the New England Solar Farm; a significant grid-connected solar farm and battery energy storage system (BESS) along with associated infrastructure, approximately 6 kilometres (km) east of the township of Uralla, which lies approximately 19 km south of Armidale in the Uralla Shire local government area (LGA) (the project).
- **C.** The Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents (DECCW 2010) were used for completion of the ACHAR in order to satisfy the EIS requirements.
- **D.** EMM issued a letter to government agencies on 6 April 2018 requesting advice on which Aboriginal parties to invite for consultation.
- **E.** The Aboriginal parties identified by the government agencies were invited to register their interest in the project on 23 April 2018 via letter and email
- **F.** An advertisement was placed in the Armidale Express on 13 April 2018 allowing a 14 day registration period.
- G. Eight Aboriginal parties registered their interest in being consulted for the project being Armidale Local Aboriginal Land Council Tom Briggs, Nunawanna Aboriginal Corporation Colin Ahoy, Armidale and New England Gumbaynggirr Descendents Hazel Green, Les Townsend, Steven Ahoy Consultants, Culturally Aware Aboriginal Heritage Consultancy Cheryl Kitchener, Nyakka Aboriginal Culture Heritage Corporation Archaeological and Cultural Heritage Consultants Rhonda Kitchener, Aaron Broad and Nganyawana Clan Group Les Ahoy.
- **H.** On 9 May 2018, EMM issued a letter to all RAPs registered for the presentation of project information and assessment methods.
- I. Nganyawana Clan Group (Les Ahoy) expressed their interest in the project on 14 May 2018.
- **J.** UPC and EMM held an on-site consultation meeting with RAPs on 21 May 2018 prior to commencing the first day of the archaeological survey.
- **K.** The draft ACHA and management recommendations, was issued to all RAPs on 28 September 2018.
 - Only two responses to the draft ACHA were received, which were submitted verbally. Cheryl Kitchener (Culturally Aware Aboriginal Heritage Consultancy) called EMM on 26 October 2018 to provide comments on the ACHA verbally. Cheryl stated that she agreed with the draft ACHA generally but had a small number of comments.
 - Rhonda Kitchener (Nyakka Aboriginal Culture Heritage Corporation Archaeological and Cultural Heritage Consultants) also called on 26 October 2018 stating her support of Cheryl's comments.
- L. UPC and EMM held a consultation meeting at Armidale Bowling Club on Friday 19 October 2018 and invited all RAPs to attend.

- RAP consultation for the project ACHA was completed between April 2018 and September 2019. The management measures outlined in the ACHA reviewed by RAPs included the establishment of a keeping place at Armidale and Region Cultural Centre and Keeping Place (ARCCKP). RAPs supported this as the keeping place.
- M. An application for a Care Agreement signed by Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place Inc has been received by Heritage NSW.

- O. Heritage NSW considered the application and supporting information provided and decided to enter into this Care Agreement subject to conditions.

1 COMMENCEMENT AND DURATION OF THE CARE AGREEMENT

- 1.1 The Care Agreement commences on the commencement date set out at Item 3 of Schedule A.

2 LOCATION OF OBJECTS TO WHICH THIS CARE AGREEMENT APPLIES

3 TRANSFER OF ABORIGINAL OBJECTS

- 4.2 The Agreement Holder is to abide by the terms of this Care Agreement.
- **4.3** The Agreement holder must ensure that all persons involved in the safekeeping of the Aboriginal objects specified in Schedule B (whether employees, contractors, sub-contractors, agents or other persons granted access) are made aware of and comply with the conditions of this Care Agreement.
- **4.4** If the Aboriginal objects specified in Schedule B are loaned out for educational/display purposes, the responsibility for their safekeeping still rests with the Agreement holder.

5 CONDITIONS OF SAFEKEEPING

- **5.1** Upon transfer to the Agreement holder, the Aboriginal objects specified in Schedule B are to be stored securely at the storage location identified at [Item 5 of Schedule A]
- 5.2 A copy of Schedule B, which list the object, must be kept with the collection.
- **5.3** The Aboriginal objects must be stored in Archival bag in locked room as agreed with the RAPS.
- 5.4 Archival bag must be externally labelled using permanent marker, and an 'independent' label on robust material (e.g. tyvek) written with permanent marker must be placed inside each box or bag, next to the object on display. The label must identify its:
 - 5.4.1 contents
 - **5.4.2** origin
 - 5.4.3 storage location (any other information that will ensure that a bag and its contents can be returned to is correct storage location if it is left outside the storage box for any reason)

- **5.5** Upon request, the Agreement holder must provide reasonable access to the Aboriginal objects specified in Schedule B, to any persons in accordance with Aboriginal lore and custom.
- **5.6** Upon request from Heritage NSW, the Agreement holder must provide reasonable access to Aboriginal objects specified in Schedule B to any Heritage NSW authorised officer.

6 NOTIFICATION AND REPORTING CONDITIONS

6.1 Written notice

- **6.1.1** The Agreement holder must notify Heritage NSW in writing within 7 days of taking custody of the Aboriginal objects specified in Schedule B.
- 6.1.2 Any requirement to provide written notice to Heritage NSW in this Care Agreement may be complied with by emailing the notice to Heritage NSW or by sending by registered post to Heritage NSW. The Heritage NSW office's contact details are specified at the front of this Care Agreement.
- **6.2** The Agreement holder must seek approval from Heritage NSW by applying in writing to Heritage NSW, if they intend to move the Aboriginal objects specified in Schedule B to another location. The Aboriginal objects, subject to the application, must not be moved to the new location, until Heritage NSW has issued a written approval to the Agreement holder.
- **6.3** The Agreement holder must provide a copy of this Care Agreement to each Registered Aboriginal Party or others consulted, within 14 days from the date of this Care Agreement, to inform these parties of the Care Agreement.

7 GENERAL PROVISIONS

7.1 Variation of Care Agreement

7.1.1 The Agreement holder may apply to Heritage NSW in writing for a variation of any conditions of a Care Agreement.

7.2 Transfer of Care Agreement to another person

- **7.2.1** Only the Secretary of Department of Premier and Cabinet can transfer Aboriginal objects under s85A1(c) of the Act.
- 7.2.2 If the Agreement holder wants the safekeeping under the Care Agreement to be the responsibility of another person, the Agreement holder must notify Heritage NSW in writing. The proposed new Care Agreement holder must then submit an application for a Care Agreement to Heritage NSW. This clause also applies in circumstances where a company is sold or wound up.

7.3 Termination of Care Agreement

- 7.3.1 The Care Agreement may be terminated at any time at the discretion of the Secretary of Department of Premier and Cabinet, including where the Agreement Holder does not honour the terms of this Care Agreement.
- **7.3.2** Upon termination of the Care Agreement, the Agreement holder must arrange with Heritage NSW for the return of the Aboriginal objects within **28 Days**.

The solar farm contains Aboriginal sites of high significance to the community, and we are committed to managing the sites with care and respect."

- Aboriginal and historical heritage sites have been identified across the project boundary and beyond.
- These sites are of high significance and importance to the Aboriginal community and must be treated with respect.
- Sites are protected by law, the development consent includes conditions allowing impacts to certain specified sites in accordance with the Aboriginal Heritage Management Plan and Historical Heritage Management Plan.
- Sites can be hard to recognize, therefore reference must be made to maps of sites in order to clearly identify them.
- Certain identified sites have been protected or salvaged by suitably qualified people. Notwithstanding, there are new find procedures which involve stopping work if suspected sites are identified.

- Aboriginal heritage sites within Zones A, B, and D have been actively protected using signed fencing. Do not enter these areas without permission.
- Historical heritage sites, and some Aboriginal heritages sites outside the solar farm have not been fenced. To avoid damaging these sites, do not cross the perimeter fence except in an emergency.

- If you suspect you have discovered an Aboriginal or historical heritage item or site, immediately stop work in the area (minimum 10 m buffer) and report to the work supervisor.
- Temporary fencing will be erected and ACEN will implement the remainder of the new find procedure in accordance with the relevant management plan.
- Suitably qualified personnel (such as archaeologists and/or Aboriginal party representatives) will determine if the site is important.
- Work is not to recommence in the area until the new find procedure is completed.
